Data Updates	Sarah Reinhold presented the updated Opioid initiative data which is held on <u>www.mharslc.org/data</u> . Data was presented regarding mortality data, warm handoff, quick response teams, medication safe and disposal. She indicated that overdose trends for the current year are increasing (72 y-t-d) and will possibly be greater than		
	2019 (89) and that COVID-19 may also be impacting overdoses this year. Sarah presented map data for Quick Response Teams, medication safes and pouches and overdose data from the systems we can obtain information from at this time. Sarah shared how users can filter reports.

Sarah indicates that work is underway to determine an Application Programming Interface with the local police, fire and EMS systems beginning with EMS.

#### Mission

#### Value Statement

Lorain County's Opioid Action Team (LCOAT) commits to work together through a comprehensive, data-driven plan that effectively blends, braids, and if necessary, acquires resources that address the priorities of prevention and reduction of factors contributing to the devastating human, economic and societal impacts of opioid abuse, overdose and death in Lorain County.

#### Vision

To empower every individual and community partner to strengthen our community's wellness.

#### Purpose

The purpose of the LCOAT is to engage collaboration among key stakeholders within the community to take a multidisciplinary approach using data to design intentional evidence based strategies that address the factors underlying accidental deaths due to drug overdoses in Lorain County.

#### Description

The LCOAT was formed in response to the 2011 Lorain County Community Health Assessment and the capacity for Project DAWN (Deaths Avoided with Naloxone) in Lorain County. The Mental Health, Addiction, and Recovery Services (MHARS) of Lorain County currently serves as the coordinating entity (i.e. Backbone) in partnership with Lorain County Public Health to address the reduction of accidental overdose deaths and increasing access to treatment and recovery supports. As the coordinating entity, LCOAT has developed a structure that connects key stakeholders with private and public entities that focus on five strategies: Reduce the Demand for Opiates, Reduce the Supply of Opiates, Overdose Prevention, Increase Access to Treatment, Increase Access to Recovery Supports; Additionally, LCOAT focuses on a key social determinant of building sustainable economic opportunities for persons in recovery from Opioid Use Disorder.

The LCOAT will consist of an Advisory Committee, Joint Information Center, Planning Section, and Operations section. The planning section will have a branch that will focus on data. The **Advisory Committee** will include the Co-lead entities (MHARS and LCPH) and will also

- Include a diverse spectrum of community stakeholders
- Define the Overall Vision
- Support Aligned Activities
- Establish Shared Measurement Practices
- Mobilize Resources
- Advance Policy
- Connections to Social Determinants of Health

The **Joint Information Center** will include Public Information officers (or the like) from the partners of LCOAT to ensure common messaging, coordination of media releases and consistent public awareness.

The **Planning Section** will: Develop Action Plans based on the Strategies (Reduce the Demand for Opiates, Reduce the Supply of Opiates, Overdose Prevention, Increase Access to Treatment, Increase Access to Recovery Supports); Situation Status; Data Reports, Evaluation. The Planning Section will be responsible for designing Strategic Plan Maps for the key strategies of LCOAT at templates for each Operations Section Branch to use. These maps are in a logic model format inclusive of problem statement, action and outcome sections.

• **Data Unit** will report to the Planning Section. The work of the Data Unit will be to define and track relevant data that will enhance efforts to monitor opioid use and opioid related morbidity and mortality, interventions and outcomes.

The **Operations Section** will consist of seven branches and focus on the following areas related to drug overdose prevention: response, prevention/education and information, treatment/recovery, prescription opioids, family support, harm reduction, and illegal supply control. The Branches will utilize the Strategic Plan Maps (created by the Planning Section) to design comprehensive evidence based (or evidence-informed) strategies that are designed to impact the identified problem(s); Lead Partners for the strategies will be defined as well as budget and resources, and timelines. Short-term measurable outcomes will be defined by each Branch for the Strategies. Definitions of each branch follow:

- **Response Branch:** Emergency and Crisis Plan to respond to individuals in crisis or a large casualty event of mass overdoses at one time;
- **Treatment and Recovery Branch:** Expand access to treatment and community support programs, including access and utilization of treatment options in the criminal justice system; Faith based organizations.
- **Family Support Branch**: Promote best practices to engage children, parents, grandparents and other family members impacted by opioid misuse and abuse; Faith based organizations.
- **Illegal Supply Control Branch:** Decrease supply of illegal opioids and other illicit substances.

- **Prevention, Education and Information Branch:** Raise awareness and knowledge of the dangers of opioids and illicit drug misuse by implementing public awareness activities; youth group education; prevent opioid and illicit drug misuse; address stigma to opioid use disorder;
- **Prescription Opioids Branch:** Promote use of best practices among healthcare providers for prescribing opioids for acute and chronic pain and medical/dental procedures
- Harm Reduction Branch: Increase capacity of harm reduction programming (including syringe exchange, naloxone distribution) to effectively provide overdose prevention and engage clients in support services.

#### Member Term and Responsibilities

All community partners who are interested in participating in one or more of the LCOAT branch(es) will be included based on their area of interest or expertise.

Co-leads of each branch will be responsible for scheduling meetings, creating and agenda, and ensure that meeting minutes are recorded

Each Branch will consist of a support member from either MHARS or LCPH and will support the administrative work of the Co-Leads.

#### **Meeting Schedule**

The Advisory committee will meet on a regular basis, but at least semi-annually, to review the operations of the program and make recommendations.

The LCOAT meeting with all branches will meet on a quarterly basis.

The Joint Information Center, and Planning Sections and each branch of the Operations Sections will meet at least every 60 days

#### **Participation Expectations**

Members of the LCOAT are expected to attend and participate in meetings that they have indicated their area(s) of interest/expertise. Additionally, members are expected to:

- Identifying goals relevant to branch description
- Create and prioritize action steps based on data driven decisions

#### Order of Business Including Decision Making, Leadership, Officers and Responsibilities

The backbone support partners (MHARS and LCPH) will serve as the coordinative, support team for LCOAT and will also work to attain and provide technical assistance to any Section of LCOAT. The Advisory Committee will convene organizations in a systematic manner to obtain support, identify available resources, and appoint experts to serve as the lead for each branch.

Decision Making – Guided by information from the Planning Section (and the Data Unit), the Advisory Committee will approve all action plans inclusive of strategies (activities) and outcomes as drafted through the Branches. This will be in a consensus-based approval format by representatives in attendance during the Advisory Committee meeting(s).

Leadership – for representatives from entities, we prefer they designate person(s) who have best expertise knowledge to serve on LCOAT (including the branches) who will have access to decision makers from the entity they represent. Members serving in capacity on the Advisory Committee are preferred to be in upper administrative capacity of the entity they represent.

Officers and Responsibilities-as this is an action team, there will not be officers formally designated for LCOAT.
