- Tonya Birney presented information regarding the third phase of our collective impact grant. Partnered work with Lorain County Public Health is leading to a Collective Impact Summit in August of 2023 to bring together existing coalitions and community partners to develop structure and strategies for cooperative work. With a focus on Health Equity, training on coordinated efforts, rather than disconnected work, a larger impact can occur.
- B. Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program Attachment B Regular Services Program (CCP-RSP) Mark Johnson
  - Mark Johnson presented that MHARS of Lorain County is poised to receive 203,842.46 in SAMHSA funding through OMHAS to support a restart of the care teams. <u>Ohio Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program Regular Services Program (CCP-RSP)</u> Purpose: OhioMHAS is seeking to gauge interest from the original ADAMHS Board partners to develop or continue CCP RSP projects through a grant opportunity. OhioMHAS hopes ADAMHS Boards build upon prior CCP RSP successes to help fulfill the original mission of the program offering "help where you are" and delivering "hope when you need it." Accordingly, ADAMHS Boards will fund targeted outreach and referral services for Ohioans with physical, intellectual/cognitive, and mental health issues and/ or substance use disorders.

The wake of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to uncover the significant impact upon the residents of Lorain County. In 2020 there were 44 deaths by suicide, a rate of 16.2 deaths per 100,000, as compared to the state average of 13 deaths per 100,000. Additionally, known as the "epidemic within the pandemic", the opioid crisis, continues to be a struggle with increased deaths by accidental overdose seen in 2020 and again in 2021 following marked reductions from 2017 in 2018 and 2019.

Despite an increased need for people to get behavioral health services; stigma, the obstacles of social determinants of health, and other barriers to care result in a disconnect between people and the services providing help.

Our Covid Care Teams, established in 2020 provided grass roots community outreach through peers and lived experience rather than clinical routes to bridge the gap between our residents and treatment and service providers. Though our clinical professionals are competent providers, outreach via these teams of trusted community partners, answered questions and engaged connections that were not being made through traditional marketing and means to access care.

In 2023, we have the opportunity to rekindle these teams that ended in October of 2021. Utilizing our Care Teams individual and group crisis counseling support navigation to services for those who have been disconnected and absent from behavioral health services. Even more critically, they provide linkages for those who are unfamiliar with behavioral health and other social service supports.

The Elyria YWCA and EL Centro were selected as the provider agencies for several key advantages. First and foremost, they are trusted entities within the community. Each has not only geographic but also cultural advantages within the county. Finally, as they are not behavioral health service providers, they offer another front door and maintain awareness of all of the service providers and programs available to those who need them.

An additional and complementary aspect of the work of these teams is the Media and Educational Campaign led within the MHARS' Publications and Communications Team. Materials provided to the community through the Care Teams are good resources. Targeted mailings, billboards, radio, newspaper and social media are employed to reduce stigma, normalize seeking help and create a no wrong door approach to finding services. This is an opportunity to assist the community in navigating to resources needed.

**Project Description:** The Confess Project staff will train barbers and stylists that serve the Black community as mental health advocates. After an initial training in person, that will take place over a two- day period, those trained will have access to an online community of support as well as a library of resources. The training will be available to 50-100 barbers and stylists and will be offered to students in local cosmetology and barber schools. The newly trained mental health advocates will be trained in four areas: active listening, validation of feelings, positive communication and stigma reduction. Long identified as trusted members of their community, the barbers and stylists will be equipped to address stigma about mental health treatment which will impact mental health outcomes.

Ad Hoc funding will be braided with other supporters of this initiative as indicated above

#### **Related Facts:**

- In Ohio, from 2010-2020, there was a 14% increase in death by suicide overall. For Black Ohioans, that increase was an alarming 87.3 %.per data obtained from the OSPF. Even as those rates began to drop in 2020 until present for the rest of Ohioans, the rate for Black Ohioans has continued to rise by 8.7%.
- The Community Health Assessment completed in 2022 by Lorain Public Health indicated disparate health outcomes for those in the Black community.
- The Communities of Color subcommittee of the Suicide Prevention Coalition was formed based on the work of the Community Readiness assessment completed in 2020. The COC supports the implementation of The Confess Project.

Number Served: 50-100 barbers, stylists and students will be trained, each impacting 100 community members

**System Impact:** Culturally relevant prevention training will improve behavioral health outcomes by reducing barriers to care, such as stigma.

# Who We Are & What We Do

The Confess Project of America, Inc. is the national organization supporting local chapters that train barbers and stylists to become mental health advocates, with the mission to build awareness and break stigmas around mental health within the Black community. The organization also trains essential frontline workers to become more empathetic and effective professionals.

The Confess Project was started as a grassroots initiative and is best recognized as 'America's first mental health barbershop movement.' With a scarcity of mental health resources available to the Black community, and a stigma around expressing feelings and personal struggles, The Confess Project sought to reduce the very high suicide rates among Black men. It's been proven that men, especially Black men, are more inclined to have real conversations with their barbers, and as a result, training these barbers to effectively react to and support their clients was a natural focus. 1.8 MIL+ people impacted

OUR WHY:

Suicide is the 3rd leading cause of death for Black men ages 18-24

Only 3-4% of Mental Health Professionals are Black The Confess Project of America and its local chapters use therapeutic-based frameworks that train barbers to listen to their clients, validate their feelings, positively communicate and reduce the stigma around mental health. For public safety workers, training focuses on relevant race and cultural identity strategies to help them better understand the feelings and emotions of young Black men and children within the community.

The Confess Project of Atlanta is opening a mental health clinic to further support those reached through the training and offer clinical support as needed.



The organization is run by therapists, scientists, academics and community advocates who are all singularly focused on helping everyone better understand and navigate the challenges of mental health.

Ohio Crisis Counseling Assistance and Training Program Regular Services Program (CCP-RSP) Purpose: OhioMHAS is seeking to gauge interest from the original ADAMHS Board partners to develop or continue CCP RSP projects through a grant opportunity. OhioMHAS hopes ADAMHS Boards build upon prior CCP RSP successes to help fulfill the original mission of the program offering "help where you are" and delivering "hope when you need it." Accordingly, ADAMHS Boards will fund targeted outreach and referral services for Ohioans with physical, intellectual/cognitive, and mental health issues and/ or substance use disorders.

The wake of the COVID-19 pandemic continues to uncover the significant impact upon the residents of Lorain County. In 2020 there were 44 deaths by suicide, a rate of 16.2 deaths per 100,000, as compared to the state average of 13 deaths per 100,000. Additionally, known as the "epidemic within the pandemic", the opioid crisis, continues to be a struggle with increased deaths by accidental overdose seen in 2020 and again in 2021 following marked reductions from 2017 in 2018 and 2019.

Despite an increased need for people to get behavioral health services; stigma, the obstacles of social determinants of health, and other barriers to care result in a disconnect between people and the services providing help.

Our Covid Care Teams, established in 2020 provided grass roots community outreach through peers and lived experience rather than clinical routes to bridge the gap between our residents and treatment and service providers. Though our clinical professionals are competent providers, outreach via these teams of trusted community partners, answered questions and engaged connections that were not being made through traditional marketing and means to access care.

In 2023, we have the opportunity to rekindle these teams that ended in October of 2021. Utilizing our Care Teams individual and group crisis counseling support navigation to services for those who have been disconnected and absent from behavioral health services. Even more critically, they provide linkages for those who are unfamiliar with behavioral health and other social service supports.

The Elyria YWCA and EL Centro were selected as the provider agencies for several key advantages. First and foremost, they are trusted entities within the community. Each has not only geographic but also cultural advantages within the county. Finally, as they are not behavioral health service providers, they offer another front door and maintain awareness of all of the service providers and programs available to those who need them.

An additional and complementary aspect of the work of these teams is the Media and Educational Campaign led within the MHARS' Publications and Communications Team. Materials provided to the community through the Care Teams are good resources. Targeted mailings, billboards, radio, newspaper and social media are employed to reduce stigma, normalize seeking help and create a no wrong door approach to finding services. This is an opportunity to assist the community in navigating to resources needed.

Additional funds are requested to increase the position to full time hours in the remaining five months of the fiscal year.

**Related Facts**: The therapist has offered counseling, assessment and crisis interventions to detained youth. Additionally, the therapist has been asked to participate in discharge planning to support youths' successful transition to the community as well staff training on behavioral health interventions. The increase to full time will allow for weekly group programming and additional collaboration with crisis services.

Number Served: 68 youth have been served through December 2022.

**System Impact:** Detained youth will receive clinical care while in the detention home preventing use of the crisis system. Further, discharge plans created with the input of the therapist will reduce recidivism by connecting youth to

behavioral health services and obtaining appropriate community supports.

The newly trained mental health advocates will be trained in four areas: active listening, validation of feelings, positive communication and stigma reduction. Long identified as trusted members of their community, the barbers and stylists will be equipped to address stigma about mental health treatment which will impact mental health outcomes.

Ad Hoc funding will be braided with other supporters of this initiative as indicated above

## **Related Facts:**

- In Ohio, from 2010-2020, there was a 14% increase in death by suicide overall. For Black Ohioans, that increase was an alarming 87.3 %.per data obtained from the OSPF. Even as those rates began to drop in 2020 until present for the rest of Ohioans, the rate for Black Ohioans has continued to rise by 8.7%.
- The Community Health Assessment completed in 2022 by Lorain Public Health indicated disparate health outcomes for those in the Black community.

• The Communities of Color subcommittee of the Suicide Prevention Coalition was formed based on the work of the Community Readiness assessment completed in 2020. The COC supports the implementation of The Confess Project.

**Project Description:** The detention home position was originally created as a pilot part time position in response to changes in the youth crisis system (Lorain Youth Crisis) which created a gap in clinical service at the detention home. Additional funds are requested to increase the position to full time hours in the remaining five months of the fiscal year.

**Related Facts**: The therapist has offered counseling, assessment and crisis interventions to detained youth. Additionally, the therapist has been asked to participate in discharge planning to support youths' successful transition to the community as well staff training on behavioral health interventions. The increase to full time will allow for weekly group programming and additional collaboration with crisis services.

Number Served: 68 youth have been served through December 2022.

**System Impact:** Detained youth will receive clinical care while in the detention home preventing use of the crisis system. Further, discharge plans created with the input of the therapist will reduce recidivism by connecting youth to

behavioral health services and obtaining appropriate community supports.

**Project Description:** Considered supportive services to address the continuing impacts of Covid, El Centro and The Elyria YWCA will reconstruct their Care Teams. These teams provide engagement and navigation to services to both individuals and groups through the FEMA defined service of Crisis Counseling.

**Related Facts:** COVID Care Teams were previously established early in the Covid-19 Pandemic through FEMA. This program ran from September 29, 2020 through September 29, 2021 and then was discontinued as FEMA funding ended. OMHAS is supporting a short-term funding opportunity to re-initiate similar services.

As a component of this project MHARS Lorain County is allocated 61,223.46 towards education and media outreach.

**Number Served:** During the first iteration of the Care Teams program. Over 4,500 individuals received Crisis Counseling, including resources and/or navigation. Over 120 group counseling events occurred, serving an additional 730 individuals. Over 2000 vaccination registrations were assisted by these teams.

### System Impact:

Communities of color were, and will again be, a significant focus for this project as disparities regarding the impact of Covid was significant to these communities. Rates of illness, severity of illness and vaccination status were all markedly worse for the BIPOC communities. Similar disparities existed and continue to exist

specific to Behavioral Health needs for these communities. El Centro and The Elyria YWCA are trusted agencies within the BIPOC communities.

Validation of life stressors and behavioral health needs, addressing stigma and cultural issues that dissuade accepting behavioral health services and normalization of help seeking followed by navigation to services, supports and providers are the critical components of the program these teams will provide. Community presence and visibility by trusted community leaders are paramount to reduce obstacles to seeking resources and services for Lorain County residents

The Board's goal is to ensure the service and its reporting requirements address a need identified in the Board's Strategic Plan.

# National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week – March 20-26

The National Institute on Drug Abuse (NIDA) and the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism are gearing up for *National Drug and Alcohol Facts Week*<sup>®</sup> (<u>NDAFW</u>) 2023 to be held March 20-26. NIDA's flagship health education observance, is held in partnership with the National Institute on Alcohol Abuse and Alcoholism (NIAAA). NDAFW is an annual, week-long <u>health observance</u> that inspires dialogue about the science of drug use and addiction among youth.

# New Resource: National Substance Use and Mental Health survey, 2021

CBHSQ/SAMHSA is excited to announce the release of the first National Substance Use and Mental Health Services Survey (N-SUMHSS) Annual Report! For more than two decades, CBHSQ/SAMHSA has been collecting data on the substance use and mental health services offered by treatment facilities using two surveys, the National Survey of Substance Abuse Treatment Services (N-SSATS) and the National Mental Health Services Survey (N-MHSS). In 2021, the N-SSATS and N-MHSS were combined into one survey, the N-SUMHSS.
