ONEOHIO LORAIN COUNTY REGION 19

Monday, October 30th, there is a community focus group scheduled at Amy Levin Center with community stakeholders to identify projects for funding consideration. Through the OneOhio opiate settlement, Lorain County will receive funds that can be used for a variety of purposes to help combat the opioid epidemic. A survey was provided to the focus group in advance of the 30th meeting. They will use this information to help guide discussions and decisions related to the OneOhio opiate settlement funding. Tom Stuber, Lead, is the representative for Lorain County with Region 19.

SPONSOR TESTIMONY ON HB 257 VIRTUAL MEETINGS

Tuesday, October 3rd, the first hearing was held on HB 257 which, if passed, would allow certain public bodies including ADAMH Boards to meet virtually. Representative Hoops and Representative Claggett, the sponsors of the bill, provided sponsor testimony to the House Government Oversight Committee. When asked by a Committee member whether there was any known opposition to the bill, the Representatives responded that there is no specific opposition to the bill they are aware of since it would not allow elected officials to meet virtually which had been a concern in earlier discussions about virtual meetings. Representative Claggett said that they have talked to many individuals and groups about the bill and mostly this is seen as good government. They don't expect any bills to move quickly and we hope to see forward progress with HB 257 over the coming months and will keep you posted on its progress.

LORAIN COUNTY CRISIS RECEIVING CENTER

October 10th, we had our bid opening at the Amy Levin Center. There were six (6) bids, five (5) of which were very close together and did not exceed the bid estimate prepared by Regency Construction. The low bidder is Panzica Construction. Todd Cooper (Owner Rep) and I are working with assistant prosecutor to finalize the language in the contract. Note, under Ohio law, political subdivisions have 60 days from the date of bid opening to execute a contract. The MHARS Board will need to pass a resolution during that time, awarding the contract to the contractor determined to be the low bidder, and authorizing the execution of a public improvement contract.

Monday, October 2nd, met with Dr. John Luellen, President, Mercy Health Lorain & Youngstown on the progress with the CRC project along with other initiatives with Mercy. Mercy has a representative on the Lorain County Crisis Continuum of Care Stakeholders Committee. We agreed to meet semiannually.

Monday, October 16th, met with a focus group of Cleveland Clinic psychiatrists NE Ohio region regarding the CRC project and the role of the Lorain County Crisis Continuum of Care Stakeholders group. There will be an opportunity to have further dialogue with this system as we embark upon the development of policies, procedures and protocols related the CRC. We will continue to update the CCF and other hospitals systems on the progress of the project.

Wednesday, October 18th, OhioMHAS confirmed with their legal department the \$4.5M announcement/award for the proposal submitted to the RFP ARPA Crisis Infrastructure projects remains in place. We will continue to move through the state approval process on the award.

Wednesday, October 18th, had the opportunity to present to the Cleveland's Healthcare and Higher Education Leaders on the CRC project. The event was held at the Advanced Technology Center in Cleveland. The target

Governor DeWine Announces Resources Available for School Athletic Coaches to Better Support Athletes

September 12, 2023

(COLUMBUS, Ohio)—Ohio Governor Mike DeWine announced the availability of state training resources aimed at giving Ohio school athletics coaches the tools they need to help student athletes struggling with their mental health. The recently passed biennial budget -- [House Bill 33](#) -- includes a provision that requires all coaches to complete the training before they can apply for or renew their pupil activity program permits.

“Coaches know how to motivate young people and lead them to success on the field, but may not be aware of how to help student-athletes with the challenges they may be facing off the field,” said Governor DeWine. “The goal is to give coaches the tools they need to help identify student athletes who may be struggling and connect them with the help they need.”

The new law requires the Ohio Department of Education to work with the Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services to provide options of approved trainings that help coaches satisfy requirements needed to obtain pupil activity permits, which are required for licensed educators and non-licensed school employees who direct, supervise, or coach a student activity program that involves athletics, routine or regular physical activity, or activities with health and safety considerations. An individual must complete the training each time the individual applies for or renews a pupil activity program permit and present evidence of each successful completion to the State Board of Education.

“This law does not intend to make coaches act as therapists or other mental health professionals,” said Ohio Department of Mental Health and Addiction Services Director Lori Criss. “The training helps them recognize signs of potential mental health issues and how to take action to connect students and their families with the right people in their communities who can help.”

Students face a new set of challenges, as described by the United States Surgeon General Vivek H. Murthy in his [Protecting Youth Mental Health advisory](#). In the decade leading up to the pandemic, feelings of persistent sadness and hopelessness—as well as suicidal thoughts and behaviors—increased nearly 40 percent among young people, according to the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention’s [Youth Risk Behavior Surveillance System](#).

“Coaches have a unique view of students’ lives as they face challenges and experience successes alongside their peers outside of the school day,” said Dr. Chris Woolard, interim superintendent of public instruction. “Mental health training can help coaches recognize and respond to students’ needs to ensure they are supported in all of their environments, including athletics spaces.”

WHAT IS PREVENTION?



Ohio Prevention promotes the health and safety of individuals and communities. It focuses on reducing the likelihood of or delaying the onset of behavioral health problems (i.e. substance abuse, mental illness, suicide and problem gambling). Interventions Primary prevention services are a planned sequence of culturally appropriate, science-driven strategies intended to facilitate attitude and behavior change for individuals and communities. They can be direct or indirect.

* Direct Services: Interactive prevention interventions that require personal contact with small groups to influence individual-level change.

* Indirect Services: Population-based prevention interventions that require sharing resources and collaborating to contribute to community-level change.



THE PUBLIC HEALTH MODEL

Prevention in Ohio is grounded in the public health model, which focuses on improving the well-being of populations. Public health draws on a science base that is multi-disciplinary and engages the entire community through the social-ecological model. Prevention aims to reduce underlying risk factors that increase the likelihood of mental, emotional and behavioral (MEB) health disorders and simultaneously to promote protective factors that decrease MEB health disorders. MEB health disorders include but are not limited to substance use disorders, mental illness, suicide, problem gambling, etc.

CSAP Prevention Strategies

1. Information Dissemination
2. Prevention Education
3. Alternative Activities
4. Community Based Process
5. Problem ID & Referral
6. Environmental

The prevention strategies of community-based process, education and environmental are key prevention strategies, due to the intervention strength they contribute to influencing attitudes, behaviors, policy standards and impacting outcomes at the community and societal levels.

EDUCATION:

Focuses on the delivery of services to target audiences with the intent of influencing attitude and/or behavior.



THE CENTER FOR SUBSTANCE ABUSE PREVENTION (CSAP) STRATEGIES DEFINE

A Comprehensive Approach to Prevention Service Delivery



Community-Based Process

The community-based process (CBP) is essential to comprehensive prevention efforts. CBP acts as the foundation for the other five strategies. Without a CBP, none of the other CSAP strategies can be implemented, and if they are, they certainly will not be as effective. Strategies should be selected through a community-based process (e.g. a community coalition or a youth-led program), and not merely by one prevention professional or prevention agency. All other strategies are organized, planned, and implemented as a result of the collaboration during a community-based process. This strategy focuses on enhancing the ability of the organization or community to provide prevention services through planning, training, interagency collaboration, coalition building and/or networking. Community-based process activities are essential to effectively implement an environmental strategy. Planning and meeting must result in the selection of either a prevention education or environmental strategy to allow for the return on investment of the community's resources invested in the coalition building, capacity building and planning process.

Education

This strategy focuses on the delivery of services to target audiences with the intent of increasing knowledge and skills as well as influencing attitude and/or behavior. It involves two-way communication and is distinguished from information dissemination by the fact that interaction between educator/facilitator and participants is the basis of the activities. Activities influence critical life skills and social/emotional learning including decision-making, refusal skills, critical analysis and systematic judgment abilities.

Environmental

This strategy is designed to establish or change standards or policies that will reduce the incidence and prevalence of behavioral health problems in a population. This is accomplished through media, messaging, policy and enforcement activities conducted at multiple levels in the social-ecological model (considers the complex interplay between individual, relationship, community, and societal factors).

The following three strategies support the implementation of the above key strategies. These are implemented in conjunction with Community-Based Process, Education and Environmental strategies.

* **Alternatives:** This strategy focuses on providing opportunities for positive behavior support as a means of reducing risk taking behavior and reinforcing protective factors. Alternative programs include a wide range of social, cultural and community service/volunteer activities. These activities must be conducted as a part of a larger comprehensive prevention effort and are best when paired with opportunities to build attachment and bonding to families, schools, communities, and peers. Otherwise, they are merely a fun activity that cannot be distinguished from healthy participation in community life.

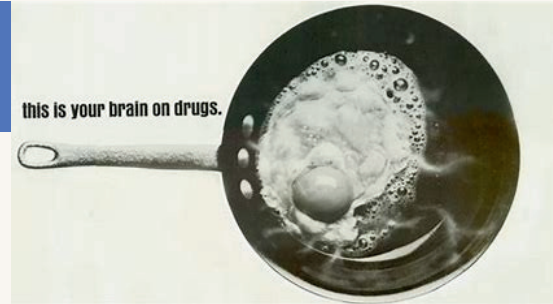
* **Information Dissemination:** This strategy focuses on building awareness of mental, emotional and behavioral health and the impact on individuals, families and communities, as well as the dissemination of information about prevention services. It is characterized by one-way communication from source to audience.

* **Problem Identification & Referral:** This strategy focuses on referring individuals who are currently involved in primary prevention services and who exhibit behavior that may indicate the need for a behavioral health assessment. This strategy does not include clinical assessment, treatment for behavioral health disorders. Although SBIRT (Screening Brief Intervention and Referral to Treatment) services could be included in this strategy, it cannot be funded by SAPT block grant prevention funds. The Problem Identification and Referral strategy is implemented when an individual enrolled in a direct service is identified as possibly needing or may benefit from services that exceed the scope of prevention.

Risk and Protective Factors

Risk factors -A characteristic at the biological, psychological, family, community, or cultural level that precedes and is associated with a higher likelihood of problem outcomes.

Protective factors-A characteristic at the individual, family, or community level that is associated with a lower likelihood of problem outcomes. Also known as “assets,” protective factors are conditions that help to buffer youth from exposure to risk factors by either reducing the impact of the risk factor or changing the way that youth respond to those risks.

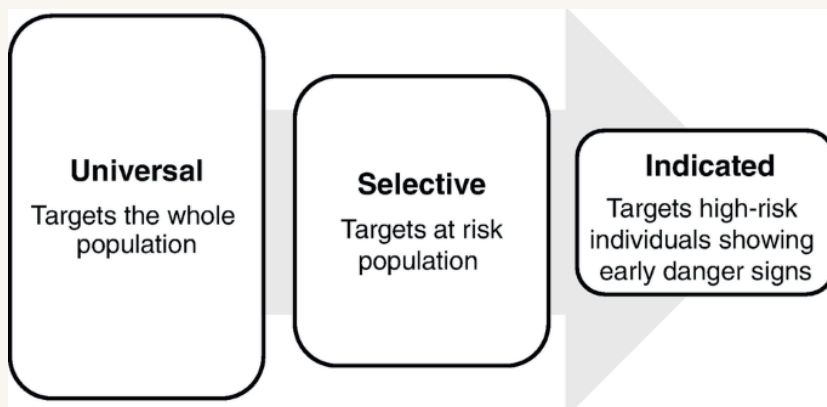

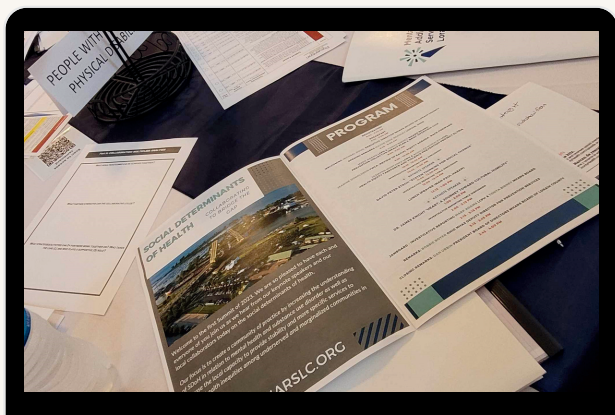

- (5) a family member of an individual who receives or had received mental health services, and
- (6) a family member of an individual who receives or had received addiction services.

Others not assigned these specific positions are “advocates.”

Terms: According to Ohio Revised Code for Mental Health, Alcohol and Drug Addiction Boards: Four years is a full term. Board Members can be appointed to fill partial, unexpired terms and for a maximum of ten (10) years.

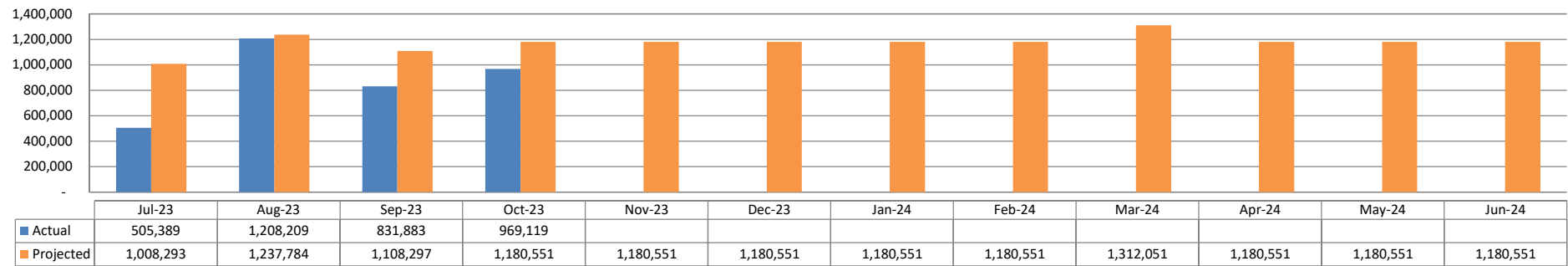

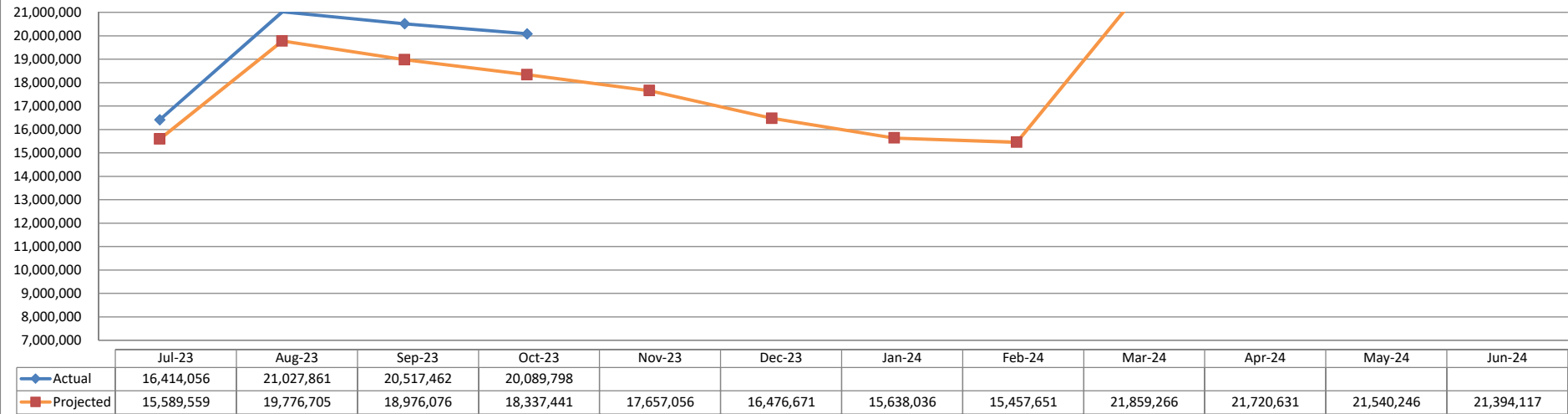

GTC Substance Use Disorders Educational and Training Program for Latinx Clergy and Church Leaders will consist of funding benchmark achievements at four components, funded at benchmark achievements of the program.

Component I. Completion of Coursework: Spiritual Caregiving to Help Addicted Persons and Families.

This component trains Clergy, Pastors, and Church Leaders in four areas 1. Recognizing Addiction; 2. Pastoral/Care of addicted Persons and Families; 3. Self-Understanding / Understanding Prevention Strategies and 4. The Role of the Community in Recovery from Addiction. This component requires 21 classroom hours with trainer and participants. Meeting weekly for seven weeks, this component is taught by Rev. Dr. Felix Muniz who holds a Doctoral of Ministry in Theology and has a CDCA with the Ohio Chemical Dependency Professional Board (OPCB) and is candidate for the LCDCIII Licensure and has over 20 years of experience in the chemical dependency field. This component is also taught with the assistance of other trainers that hold the credentials and certification to teach in those particular areas. Based on the *handbook and curriculum, in Spiritual Caregiving to Help Addicted Persons and Families*, this training component provides faith leaders with basic knowledge about addiction, strategies to help families and children, and information about community resources and mutual support groups. Obtaining these trainings results in clergy and church leaders being more knowledgeable and comfortable in supporting those hurting members of their congregation and faith community begin the road to recovery.

Component II. CDCA Credentialing and Certification: In this component, Latinx Clergy and Church Leaders that have completed the first component are trained to be a certified as a Chemical Dependency Counselor Assistants (CDCA preliminary level or phase I) with Ohio Chemical Dependency Professional Board (OPCB). To do so, requires 40 hours of training in six areas: Theories of Addiction (5 hours), Counseling Procedures & Strategies with Addicted Populations (14 hours), Group Process & Techniques Working with addicted populations (5 hours), Assessment & Diagnosis of Addiction (3 hours), Treatment Planning (7 hours) and Ethics (6 hours).

In addition, capacity building services is provided by the National Hispanic and Latino ATTC Network (Addiction Technology Transfer Center Network), providing high-quality training and technical assistance to improve the capacity of the workforce serving Hispanic and Latino communities in behavioral health prevention, treatment, and recovery. They disseminate and support the implementation of evidence-based and promising practices to enhance service delivery, promote the growth of a diverse, culturally competent workforce, and bridge access to quality behavioral health services. They are committed to increasing health equity and access to effective culturally and linguistically grounded approaches.

Component III: Successfully passing the CDCA exam and receiving this certification.

Component IV: Obtaining applicable, related employment in Lorain County.

Planning considerations or impact specific to Diversity, Equity and Inclusion:

The Galilean Theological Center Substance Use Disorders Educational & Training Program addresses disparities in the behavioral health workforce, training a cohort group of Latinx Clergy and Church Leaders in the area of Substance Use Disorder (SUD) treatment, while creating access to clinical credentials: Licensure (LCDC I, II, III) and Certification (CDCA).

By providing technical assistance, capacity building, and support to MHARS funded organizations and other community-based service providers, the program will increase the publicly funded treatment system's capacity to provide culturally and linguistically appropriate services to the Latinx population, thereby addressing health disparities and building equity within service providers. GTC seeks partnerships with social services agencies in Lorain County including Lorain UMADAOP, LCADA Way, Fortaleza, El Centro de Servicios Sociales, The Genesis House and other Community and Faith Based Organizations. These partnerships will help in developing healthier, safer, and sober communities within the Latinx population and others.

Payments **not to exceed the total contract amount of \$20,000** are based upon the following four points of achievement as deliverables per student. Students **must reside in Lorain County** to be eligible. Payments are made to the Galilean Theological Center and not to the individual students.

- Successful completion of Component 1 as evidenced by course certificate
\$500 per student achievement
- Successful completion of Component 2 as evidenced by course certificate
\$500 per student achievement
- Receipt of Chemical Dependency Counselor Assistant Certification
\$500 per student achievement
- Secured employment impacting behavioral health for Lorain County residents
\$500 per student achievement

Located at Harvest Fellowship Church of the Nazarene, 37425 Royalton Road, Grafton, Ohio which is 20 minutes away from Lorain and Elyria where there is a large concentration of Hispanic/Latinos and Latinx churches. Galilean Theological Center (GTC) is a 501c3 non-profit organization whose mission statement is to provide introductory theological education, training, and job-readiness skills for ministry, leadership, and employment in the Hispanic-Latino churches throughout Northeast Ohio. Our goal is to provide ministerial training and sound theological education to Hispanic/Latino church leaders who generally do not have access to traditional theological institutions due to language barriers, socio-economic status and/or formal educational. GTC has a partnership with Ashland Theological Seminary with the purpose to train men and women for bachelor exempt status for application to the Master's program. GTC has been training students who hold a High School diploma or equivalent GED in classical and discipline specific theological education capable of matriculating in graduate study at Ashland Theological Seminary. GTC ministerial training program has been offering (8) courses of 21 contact hours per course and three (3) seminars. GTC ministerial training program consist of (4) courses in classical disciplines of Hermeneutics, Bible, Theology and Church History, (4) courses in Hispanic Church Studies and (3) seminars in preparation for the call to ministry and research & writing for theological study.

Number Served: 14

System Impact: LatinX clergy and substance use disorder certified persons are able to enter the behavioral health workforce with job readiness, a significant assistance to our provider network. LatinX, particularly Spanish speaking, providers are desperately needed to serve the diversity and language needs of Lorain County residents.

GENERAL PROCEDURE: The executive board of an organized society operates under the society’s bylaws, the society’s parliamentary authority, and any special rules of order or standing rules of the society which may be applicable to it. Such a board may adopt its own special rules of order or standing rules only to the extent that such rules do not conflict with any of the rules of the society listed above ... A board that is not part of a society can adopt its own rules, provided that they do not conflict with anything in the legal instrument under which the board is constituted. [Emphasis added.]

Under the general parliamentary law, business is transacted in large boards according to the same rules of procedure as in other deliberative assemblies. In smaller boards, these rules apply as far as practicable, with the exceptions noted below....

PROCEDURE IN SMALL BOARDS: In a board meeting where there are not more than about a dozen members present, some of the formality that is necessary in a large assembly would hinder business. The [special] rules governing such meetings are different from the rules that hold in other assemblies ... “

With *RONR* (above) as parliamentary authority, the Mental Health, Addiction and Recovery Services Board of Lorain County adopts these "Special Rules" for the conduct of its **full Board meetings:**

1. A member may raise a hand instead of standing when seeking to obtain the floor, and may remain seated while making motions or speaking. In providing the floor, the chairperson recognizes the member or other speaker by name.
2. There is ~~a no~~ limit to the number of times a member can speak to a debatable question. **Members may speak up to 2 times per debatable question with 2-minute limit each time. The agenda item will list the allotted time per item but not to exceed 15 minutes, if no time is noted on the agenda.** However, motions to close or limit debate, including motions to limit the number of times a member can speak to a question, are in order even in meetings of a small board, although occasions where they are necessary or appropriate may be rarer than in larger assemblies. (Appeals, on the other hand, are debatable under the regular rules – that is, the chairperson may speak twice in debate on them, and each member can speak only once.)
3. Informal discussion of a subject is permitted while no motion is pending.
4. The chairperson may, without leaving the chair, speak in informal discussions and in debate, and vote on all questions.
5. Roll call votes shall be taken for motions to enter into executive session, motions concerning

the allocation of funds and/or the authorization of contracts, or for other matters as required by law. Voice votes shall be taken for all other motions. Any member may ask the Chair for a roll call vote on any motion. If this request is supported by at least one additional Board Member, a roll call vote shall be taken. In all cases a simple majority shall determine the question.

Adjacent Landlord Property:	Approximately 3.2700 acres, being described as 6140 S Broadway, Lorain, OH 44053, Parcel No. 06-21-001-101-068 by the Lorain County, Ohio, Auditor, as described by metes and bounds on <u>Exhibit “A-3”</u> and depicted on <u>Exhibit “A-4”</u> , which parcel is owned by Landlord.
Common Areas:	All parking areas, parking lots, lanes, drives, driveways, walkways, parking lot entrances and exits, sidewalks, landscaped and other unpaved areas associated with such parking amenities, parking lot lighting facilities and equipment, shared utility facilities, and all other areas outside of the buildings located on the Adjacent Landlord Property or Leased Premises, and which are intended and available for the common use of Landlord and Tenant. In addition, the Common Areas will include all such areas described above which are located on the property leased under the “Parking Leases” , as defined in Section 1.1.2 below.
Tenant’s Proportionate Share:	38.86%, see Section 6.2.1 below.

UNDER THE TERMS AND CONDITIONS BELOW.**

This Ground Sublease (this “**Lease**”) is effective as of the Effective Date and is executed by and between Landlord and Tenant with respect to the Leased Premises described below.

1. **Agreement to Lease; Defined Terms**

1.1 **Lease of Leased Premises.** Landlord leases the Leased Premises to Tenant, and Tenant leases the Leased Premises from Landlord, together with all rights, privileges, easements and appurtenances, if any, pertaining to the Leased Premises, on the terms, conditions, and limitations established in this Lease, for the Lease Term.

1.1.1 *Common Area Access.* Tenant, as well as its agents, employees, clients, patients and invitees, shall have and are granted access to and use of all Common Areas.

1.1.2 *Parking Leases.* The Leased Premises and the Adjacent Landlord Property are served by certain leases for parking on land adjacent to the Leased Premises and the Adjacent Landlord Property, such leases being more particularly described as follows: (i) the Lease Agreement dated January 7, 2009 between Eschtruth Investment LLC, as lessor, and Norcare Enterprises, Inc., as lessee, as amended by a certain First Amendment to Lease Agreement dated November 7, 2022, (ii) the Sublease Agreement dated [November 1, 2023] between Norcare Enterprises, Inc., as sublessor, and The Nord Center (Landlord), as sublessee, and (iii) the Sub-Sublease Agreement dated [November 1, 2023] between The Nord Center (Landlord), as sub-sublessor, and Mental Health and Addiction Recovery Services Board of Lorain County, as sub-sublessee (the “**Parking Sub-Sublease Agreement**”) (collectively subparts (i), (ii) and (iii) are referred to as the “**Parking Leases**”). Landlord and Tenant expressly acknowledge and agree that, for purposes of this Lease, the “Common Areas” will be deemed to cover and include the property leased under the Parking Leases, and that the usage of such portions of the Common Areas will be governed by the terms of this Lease, and the Parking Leases, as applicable.

1.1.3 *Master Lease.* As is further set forth in Article 17, this Lease is subject to that certain Lease Agreement dated as of [November 1, 2023] (the “**Master Lease**”) by and between Norcare Enterprises, Inc. (the “**Master Lessor**”) as lessor, and Landlord, as lessee, for the real property, improvements, and personal property constituting the collectively the Leased Property and the Adjacent Landlord Property.

1.2 **Defined Terms.** When used in this Lease, defined terms should have the meanings established in this Lease. Various defined terms are defined above, and various other terms are defined below as well as in other areas in the text of this Lease.

1.2.1 “**Delivery Date**” has the meaning assigned in Section 3 below.

1.2.2 “**Facilities**” means all buildings and other improvements (including parking and paved areas, etc.) constructed by Tenant on the Leased Premises. References in this Lease to the term “**Facilities**,” however, specifically exclude Tenant’s Property, as defined below. The Facilities shall be and remain at all times Tenant’s sole property during

the Lease Term. Upon the expiration or earlier termination of this Lease, title to the Facilities shall automatically and immediately vest in Landlord without further action by Tenant, although Tenant shall, upon Landlord's request, execute and deliver appropriate documentation conveying the Facilities to Landlord.

1.2.3 **"Governing Authorities"** means all federal, state, local (municipal and/or county), and quasi-governmental agencies, departments, councils, boards, commissions, authorities, and the like that have jurisdiction over the development, construction, and/or use of the Leased Premises.

1.2.4 **"Permittees"** means all employees, customers, vendors, suppliers, invitees, licensees, authorized representatives, contractors, assignees, sublessees, concessionaires, consultants, and other permitted persons of the party in question.

1.2.5 **"Tenant's Property"** means all of the following that are now or in the future located on the Leased Premises: (i) personal property, trade fixtures, furniture, and equipment; and (ii) all signage attached to Tenant's Facilities, all pylon signs located from time to time, and all monument signs reserved for Tenant's sole use that may be located from time to time (called, collectively, the **"On-Site Signage"**). Tenant may remove or replace Tenant's Property at any time during the Lease Term unless expressly provided otherwise by the terms of this Lease.

1.2.6 **"Tenant's Work"** describes the development and construction of the Facilities that Tenant shall, subject to the terms of this Lease, perform with respect to the Leased Premises.

2. **Conditions Precedent.**

2.1 **Conditions Precedent.** This Lease and Landlord's and Tenant's obligations under this Lease are subject to satisfaction or waiver by Landlord and/or Tenant, as applicable, of each of the following conditions (all of which are called collectively, the **"Conditions Precedent"**) prior to the Delivery Date:

2.1.1 **Management Approvals.** Each of Landlord and Tenant shall have obtained the approval of its senior management and/or Board of Directors to enter into this Lease.

2.1.2 **Governmental Approvals.** Tenant agrees and acknowledges that it has or will through the Construction Period obtain all permits and approvals required of the Governing Authorities, as such permits and approvals become applicable, to enable Tenant to develop, construct, and use the Leased Premises for Tenant's Use (the **"Tenant's Permit Approvals"**), including: (i) all building permits; (ii) all site development plans; (iii) all plans showing or concerning curb cuts, signage, lighting, access, deceleration lanes, median breaks, drainage plans, landscape plans, and similar development and construction; and (iv) all operating permits, conditional use permits, and (v) zoning designation, including rezoning approval by the Lorain City Council, if applicable. Notwithstanding any provisions of this Lease to the contrary, Landlord agrees to cooperate with Tenant and

to use its best efforts to promptly prepare and file all necessary documentation to affect all applications, notices, petitions and filings, and to obtain all permits, consents, approvals and authorizations of all third parties and governmental authorities which are necessary for the parties to carry out the terms of this Lease.

3. **Delivery of Leased Premises.**

3.1 ***Delivery Date.*** Landlord shall deliver exclusive possession of the Leased Premises to Tenant on [November 1, 2023] (the “***Delivery Date***”). Tenant acknowledges and agrees that it takes and accepts the Leased Premises in its as-is, where-is condition on the Delivery Date, and that Landlord has no work or improvement obligations with respect to the Leased Premises under this Lease.

4. **Construction of Improvements.**

4.1 ***Construction Period.*** Promptly after the Delivery Date, Tenant shall commence construction of Tenant’s Work described in Section 4.2 below. Tenant must complete Tenant’s Work no later than the expiration of the Construction Period. The parties agree and acknowledge that the target date for completion of the Tenant’s Work is autumn, 2025.

4.2 ***Tenant’s Work.*** During the Construction Period, Tenant, at its sole cost and expense, is solely responsible to design, entitle, permit, place, and construct the Facilities at the Leased Premises, and, to the extent Tenant undertakes construction in accordance with this Lease, Tenant shall do so: (i) in accordance with plans and specifications approved by Landlord in writing, (ii) in a good and workmanlike manner, free of defects; (iii) in compliance with all Laws and all matters of title; and (iv) diligently, without undue delay not caused by a Force Majeure Event.

4.3 ***Tenant Improvement Allowance.*** Landlord shall provide a Tenant improvement allowance (the “**Allowance Amount**”) in an amount not less than One Million Nine Hundred Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$1,900,000) (the “**Minimum Allowance Amount**”) and not more than Three Million Four Hundred Thousand and 00/100 Dollars (\$3,400,000). Landlord acknowledges that the Minimum Allowance Amount has been confirmed as available for draw from third parties in the form of grants, awards, and donations. Landlord shall reimburse Tenant (or pay directly to Tenant’s general contractor if directed by Tenant) for the Allowance Amount upon receipt by Landlord of contractor’s receipts and lien waivers for work actually performed on the Leased Premises. Landlord shall only reimburse Tenant or pay Tenant’s general contractor for those contractors’ receipts that are approved by both Landlord and Tenant and for which lien waivers satisfactory to Landlord have been provided. Tenant shall provide Landlord with such approved receipts together with lien waivers by the twentieth (20th) day of each month and Landlord shall reimburse Tenant (or pay Tenant’s general contractor) no later than the twentieth (20th) day of the following month. The final disbursement of the Allowance Amount is conditioned upon receipt of full lien waivers from all contractors, subcontractors and materialmen furnishing labor or materials to the Leased Premises. Tenant shall be required to incur the costs, complete the work, and draw down the Allowance Amount by no later than the Commencement

Date. All receipts and lien waivers shall be provided to Landlord by no later than thirty (30) days after the expiration of the Construction Period. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Tenant understands and agrees that in no event will Landlord be required to reimburse Tenant any portion of the stated Allowance Amount under this Section 4.3 unless and until Landlord has received the funds to cover such reimbursement requests.

5. Term.

5.1 **Primary Term.** This Lease is valid and enforceable as of the Effective Date and through the Lease Term, subject to the terms and conditions described in this Lease. The commencement of the Base Rent, Additional Rent, and any other charges under the Lease shall begin on the Commencement Date and shall remain in effect through the Primary Term, except as otherwise provided herein. Landlord and Tenant shall promptly, after the occurrence of the Commencement Date, exchange fully executed copies of the Commencement Date Agreement attached as **Exhibit “B”**.

5.2 **Holdover Term.** If Tenant shall hold over after the expiration of the Primary Term, the holdover tenancy shall continue in accordance with all the terms of this Lease, except that Base Rent shall equal 150% of the Base Rent in effect at the end of the Lease Term (the holdover period shall be referred to in this Lease as the “**Holdover Term**”). Landlord shall be deemed to consent to Tenant’s holding over if it is reasonably required by Tenant to perform or satisfy any of Tenant’s obligations to Landlord under this Lease, applicable law, or otherwise. Except as provided herein, a Holdover Term may be terminated by either Landlord or Tenant upon not less than ninety (90) days written notice; however, any Holdover Term shall end only at the end of a calendar month.

5.3 **Lease Term.** The Primary Term, Holdover Term, and any and all other extensions or renewals of the Lease are collectively referred to throughout this Lease as the “**Lease Term**.”

6. Rental.

6.1 **Base Rent.** Tenant shall pay Base Rent to Landlord in advance on the first day of each calendar month, without notice, demand, offset or deduction, except as otherwise expressly provided in this Lease. Rent for any period less than a calendar month shall be prorated, based on the number of calendar days in the month. Tenant has prepaid, and Landlord acknowledges receipt of, Base Rent for the entire Primary Term.

6.2 **Additional Rent.** In addition to Base Rent (if applicable), Tenant shall pay prior to delinquency, for the period commencing on the Commencement Date and continuing throughout the balance of the Lease Term, as additional rental (“**Additional Rent**” and, collectively with Base Rent, “**Rent**”), the following items:

6.2.1 **Common Area Maintenance Charges.** Tenant shall pay Tenant’s Proportionate Share of all operating expenses incurred by Landlord regarding the Common Areas (the “**Common Area Maintenance Charges**”). The operating expenses of the

Common Areas are those amounts paid or payable in connection with the maintenance, repair, replacement, and operation of the Common Areas. The Common Area Maintenance Charges will include, but will not be limited to, those costs and expenses associated with any landscaping; sprinklers; security; fire protection oversight; maintenance; repair and monitoring; repaving, replacing, repairing, and restriping parking lots; public utilities (if applicable); insuring the Common Areas (if applicable), lighting; maintenance; removal of snow, trash, rubbish, garbage and other refuse; Landlord's compliance with present and future laws and ordinances; maintenance of sanitary sewers, storm sewers, domestic water, storm water, detention, retention basins, water filtration and treatment facilities, if any; pylon signs; directional and traffic signs and signals (if applicable); security and security patrols; As soon as practicable after the end of each calendar year ending during the Term and after Lease termination, Landlord shall render a statement in reasonable detail showing for the preceding calendar year or fraction thereof, as the case may be, the Common Area Maintenance Charges and Tenant's Proportionate Share attributable thereto. Landlord's expenditures on items that would be capitalized pursuant to GAAP shall be amortized over their useful life and Common Area Maintenance Charges for any year shall only include the amortized portion attributable to such year. For example, if Landlord expends \$100,000 in 2030 on a capital improvement with a 10 year life, Common Area Maintenance charges for 2030 shall be \$10,000, and \$10,000 for each of the nine subsequent years. Tenant shall have the right to audit Landlord's statements for Common Area Maintenance Charges, and adjustments shall be made based on the outcome of any such audit.

6.2.2 *Property Taxes.* All ad valorem real estate taxes, sewer and sewer rents or charges, business improvement district and other assessments, special or otherwise, levied, assessed or imposed by the applicable taxing authority or upon or with respect to Leased Premises, if any (collectively "***Real Property Taxes***"), assessed against the Leased Premises for periods during the Lease Term but only for periods during the Lease Term after the Delivery Date. Real Property Taxes for any period less than a calendar year shall be prorated. Tenant's liability to pay Real Property Taxes shall be prorated on the basis of a 365-day year to account for any fractional portion of a fiscal tax year included at the beginning or end of the Lease Term. Landlord shall authorize and instruct the assessing authority to forward to Tenant all Real Property Tax bills on the Leased Premises and/or any part. If Landlord pays any Real Property Taxes agreed to be paid by Tenant, then, within ten (10) days after Landlord's presentation of a receipted bill, Tenant shall promptly repay the taxes to Landlord as Additional Rent. For purposes of clarification, so long as Tenant is a governmental entity exempt from paying Real Property Taxes, Tenant shall have no obligation to pay any such Real Property Taxes; provided, however, that in the event Tenant's successor or assign is not an exempt entity, or it is determined the Leased Premises otherwise is not exempt from Real Property Taxes, Tenant shall be responsible for payment of the same under this Section 6.2.2.¹

6.3 *Payment of Rental.* Tenant shall pay the Rent provided in this Lease to Landlord, when due, at Landlord's office, or to any other person or place as Landlord may designate by

¹ Landlord applied for parcel to be exempt from taxation, but does not have decision. This provision was added by MHARS due to its governmental status, which appears would make it exempt. notice to Tenant, or as otherwise expressly provided in this Lease. At Tenant's election, rent may be paid by electronic funds transfer to an account to be designated by Landlord.

6.4 ***Security Deposit.*** Tenant shall not be required to pay a security deposit.

6.5 ***Tenant Overpayments.*** If either Landlord or Tenant discovers, at any time during the Lease Term or within a reasonable time afterwards, that Tenant has paid Landlord rental or other amounts in excess of those amounts that Tenant was obligated to pay at the time, the applicable party shall promptly notify the other party and, without prejudice to any other remedies, whether legal or equitable, available to Tenant, Tenant shall have the right to treat all or a portion of the overpaid amounts as pre-paid rental, in which event the portion treated as pre-paid rental shall be applied as a credit toward future amounts due Landlord from Tenant under this Lease, and any amounts that exceed future amounts due shall be promptly refunded to Tenant.

7. **Possession and Use.**

7.1 ***Tenant's Use.*** Tenant may use the Leased Premises only for the operation of a crisis receiving center, including emergency, inpatient, and outpatient medical care, and including the provision of detoxification services, and all uses reasonably related to or associated with the foregoing ("**Tenant's Use**"). Tenant will observe and comply with such reasonable rules and regulations as Landlord may prescribe from time to time with respect to the Leased Premises, provided in the event of any conflict or inconsistency between any such rules and regulations and this Lease, the terms of this Lease shall supersede and govern. Tenant shall not use or occupy the Leased Premises for any unlawful purpose, or in any manner that will violate the certificate of occupancy for the Leased Premises, or that will constitute waste, nuisance or unreasonable annoyance to Landlord or any other tenant or user of the retained property.

7.2 ***Compliance with Laws.*** Tenant, at no cost or expense to Landlord, shall promptly and properly observe, comply with and execute all present and future orders, regulations, directions, rules, laws, ordinances, and requirements of all Governing Authorities that arise directly from Tenant's use, occupancy, or enjoyment of all or part of the Leased Premises during the Lease Term.

7.3 ***Hazardous Materials.*** Tenant agrees not to cause or permit any generation, storage, handling or disposal of any flammable explosives, petroleum or petroleum by-products, natural gas, natural gas liquids, liquefied natural gas, or synthetic gas usable for fuel or mixture thereof, radon, radioactive materials or wastes, hazardous materials or wastes, toxic materials or wastes, asbestos, asbestos-containing materials, PCBs, or any other material, substance or waste that (i) is recognized as being hazardous or dangerous to health or the environment, (ii) is regulated or may form the basis for liability under any Environmental Laws (as defined below), (iii) is present in the environment in such quantity or state that it contravenes any Environmental Laws, or (iv) requires or will require remediation or removal under any Environmental Laws (collectively "**Hazardous Materials**") in or upon the Leased Premises during the Term of the Lease except in accordance with Environmental Laws. "**Environmental Laws**" means all present and future federal, state, county, municipal and other local statutes, laws, codes, ordinances,

administrative and court orders and directives, rules and regulations applicable to the Leased Premises or to the use and occupancy of the Leased Premises or to operations conducted at or ownership of the Leased Premises from time to time applicable at any time, relating to the protection of the environment, human health or safety or national or homeland security and including, without limitation, those requirements relating to the generation, manufacture, use, storage, management, transportation, treatment, discharge, disposal or reporting of Hazardous Materials, nuisance claims, employee and product safety, and the emission or release of Hazardous Materials into the air, surface water, ground water, land surface, subsurface strata or any drain, pipeline, building or structure. In the event that any other substance used at the Leased Premises shall, during the Term, become designated as a Hazardous Material, then Tenant shall, to the extent practicable, discontinue use of the substance in or upon the Leased Premises except to the extent such use is in accordance with Environmental Laws. If it is not practicable for Tenant to discontinue such use, then Tenant agrees that it shall only continue use of the Hazardous Material in or upon the Leased Premises in a manner consistent with all Environmental Laws. Tenant shall assume sole responsibility for any and all demands, claims, enforcement actions, costs and expenses, liabilities, losses, damages, suits, actions, fines or penalties of any kind, including the cost of all remediation efforts and clean-up plans, arising out of (i) Tenant's breach of this Section, (ii) Tenant's violation of any Environmental Laws, or (iii) any Environmental Matter caused by any act or omission of Tenant or its agents, employees, contractors, licensees, invitees; except where such agent, contractor, licensee, or invitee is Landlord. Landlord shall assume sole responsibility for any and all demands, claims, enforcement actions, costs, expenses, liabilities, losses, damages, suits, actions, fines or penalties of any kind, including the cost of all remediation efforts and clean-up plans, arising out of any Environmental Matter caused by any act or omission of Landlord or its agents, employees or contractors; except where such agent or contractor is Tenant. "**Environmental Matter**" means any matter arising out of, relating to or resulting from pollution, contamination, sanitation, nuisance, emissions, discharges, releases or threatened releases of Hazardous Materials, or otherwise arising out of, resulting from, or relating to, the generation, manufacture, use, storage, management, transportation, treatment, discharge, disposal or reporting of Hazardous Materials, or the application of Environmental Laws. The foregoing obligations shall survive the termination or earlier expiration of this Lease.

7.4 **Improvements.** Subject to the approval of the Governing Authorities and the acquisition of any required permits, and in compliance with any matters of record, and subject to Landlord's written approval of plans and specifications therefor, Tenant may place and maintain on the Leased Premises any and all Facilities and Tenant's Property as it may desire for Tenant's Use. Tenant may remove Tenant's Property without their replacement or reimbursement to Landlord so long as Tenant repairs any damage caused by the removal. Tenant shall not remove any Facilities without Landlord's express written approval. Tenant will not be required to remove any of the Tenant's Property or Facilities at the expiration or sooner termination of this Lease, and any of Tenant's Property remaining and not removed within thirty (30) days after the termination of the Lease shall become the property of the Landlord without warranty, express or implied. Notwithstanding anything contained herein to the contrary, Tenant shall cause any Facilities or Tenant's Property, if any, located on the Leased Premises at the expiration or sooner termination of this Lease to be in good condition and repair, reasonable wear and tear excepted.

7.5 **Alterations.** Without the need or requirement of prior approval from the Landlord, Tenant may make interior non-structural alterations, reductions, or additions to the Leased Premises as Tenant may desire, provided that they do not violate any matters of record, or any requirements of any Governing Authorities having jurisdiction over the Leased Premises. Any exterior or structural alterations, reductions, or additions to the Leased Premises shall require Landlord's prior written consent (and Landlord's consent of plans and specifications therefor), such consent not to be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. All alterations, additions, and replacements will be made in compliance with all Laws and matters of record, in a good workmanlike manner, and without cost to Landlord. Tenant also shall have the right to remove (without the obligation to replace or the obligation to reimburse Landlord for) any trees, dirt, vegetation, landscaping, sidewalks, and curbing on the Leased Premises, subject to Tenant's compliance with all Laws and the above requirements.

7.6 **Signs and Trademarks.** Subject to Landlord's prior written approval thereof, Tenant shall have the right to erect or attach upon all parts of the Leased Premises all signs, sign faces, posters, banners, and trademark items as it may deem proper, subject to first obtaining any required approvals of the Governing Authorities, and subject to any matters of record. All On-Site Signage including any signs, sign faces, posters, banners, and trademark items (except for the sign structures themselves) shall be removed by Tenant at the expiration or termination of this Lease at Tenant's sole expense. Landlord shall reasonably cooperate with Tenant (at no cost or expense to Landlord) in obtaining any necessary permits or variances from governmental restrictions placed upon the use of signs.

7.7 **Surrender.** Upon expiration of the Lease Term (or upon earlier termination for any reason), Tenant shall quit and surrender the Leased Premises, including the Facilities and Tenant's Property, in good condition and repair, and in compliance with all Laws and all matters of title and in the condition required of Tenant under this Lease.

8. **Maintenance; Operating Expenses.**

8.1 **Repairs.** Tenant, at its sole cost and expense, shall maintain, repair and replace, if necessary, the Leased Premises and all portions thereof, including the Facilities, the Tenant's Property, and all improvements thereon, including without limitation, structural systems, roof, load-bearing walls, floor slabs, HVAC system and equipment, utility systems such as lighting and plumbing, storm drainage systems, windows, glass, doors, glazing and floor coverings, landscaped and irrigation areas, sidewalks, driveways, signage as well as all other facilities, trade fixtures and other equipment located on the Leased Premises. Landlord shall be responsible for maintaining and repairing all off-site improvements (including all improvements in the Common Areas), including any offsite paved areas used for access to or from the Leased Premises, and Tenant shall pay to Landlord the Tenant's Proportionate Share for such Landlord services in accordance with the provisions of Section 6.2 above.

8.2 **Utilities.** Tenant shall pay all charges for gas, electricity, telephone, sewer, water, and any other utilities provided to the Leased Premises (including connection fees). Tenant shall

be solely responsible for the performance of any and all maintenance and repair to the utilities serving the Leased Premises. Tenant will be responsible for assuring that all billing statements for all utilities will be mailed directly to Tenant for payment. If Landlord receives utility billing statements, Landlord shall promptly forward the bill to Tenant for payment. No cessation or interruption of any utilities shall relieve Tenant of any duties or obligations under this Lease. If any utilities are shared, the bill therefor shall be considered a Common Area Maintenance Expense.

8.3 ***Triple Net Lease.*** Except as otherwise expressly provided in this Lease, this Lease is intended to be and shall be deemed and construed as a “net lease,” pursuant to which Landlord shall receive the Base Rent without reduction or offset for any other charge or expense, and free and clear of all taxes, impositions, charges or expenses of any nature whatsoever. Under no circumstances or conditions, whether now existing or hereafter arising, or whether beyond the present contemplation of the parties, shall Landlord be expected or required to make any payment of any kind whatsoever or be under any other obligation or liability hereunder, except as otherwise expressly set forth in this Lease.

9. **Damage and Condemnation of Leased Premises.**

9.1 ***Restoration of the Leased Premises.*** If the main building or any other Tenant Improvements are damaged or destroyed during the Term, Tenant shall promptly notify Landlord of such damage or destruction. If the damage is such that it is estimated it shall take more than 180 days after commencement of repairs, then Tenant may terminate this Lease by delivering written notice to Landlord within thirty (30) days after the initial casualty notice has been delivered by Tenant to Landlord. In the event Tenant does not terminate the Lease, then Tenant shall repair and restore the damage with reasonable promptness to substantially the condition existing prior to the damage, at Tenant’s sole cost and expense. All such repair, restoration or rebuilding shall be performed with due diligence in a good and workmanlike manner and in accordance with all applicable laws and ordinances.

9.2 ***Total Taking.*** If the whole of the Leased Premises shall be taken or condemned for any public or quasi-public use or purpose, by right of eminent domain or by purchase in lieu thereof, or if a substantial portion of the Leased Premises shall be so taken or condemned that the portion or portions remaining is or are not sufficient and suitable, in the mutual reasonable judgment of Landlord and Tenant, for the continued operation of the business contemplated by this Lease to be conducted thereon, therein or therefrom so as to effectively render the Leased Premises and Improvements untenable, then this Lease and the Term hereby granted shall cease and terminate as of the date on which the condemning authority takes possession and all Rent shall be paid by Tenant to Landlord up to that date or refunded by Landlord to Tenant if Rent has previously been paid by Tenant beyond that date.

9.3 ***Partial Taking.*** If a portion of the Leased Premises are taken, and the portion or portions remaining can, in the reasonable judgment of Tenant, be adapted and used for the conduct of Tenant’s business operation, such that the Premises and Improvements are not effectively rendered untenable, then provided that Tenant receives sufficient funds from the condemning authority, Tenant shall promptly restore the remaining portion or portions thereof to a condition

comparable to their condition at the time of such taking or condemnation, less the portion or portions lost by the taking, and this Lease shall continue in full force and effect. If, however, in the reasonable judgment of Tenant, the Premises cannot adequately be adapted and used for the conduct of Tenant's business operations, or in the event the award is not sufficient to restore the Leased Premises, then Tenant shall have the right to terminate this Lease and any award paid to Tenant shall be assigned to Landlord.

9.4 ***Award.*** The entire award for the Leased Premises or the portion or portions thereof so taken shall be apportioned between Landlord and Tenant as follows: (i) if this Lease terminates due to a taking or condemnation, Tenant shall be entitled to receive the portion of the award which is attributable to the unamortized cost of the Tenant Improvements as reflected in Tenant's books and records; (ii) Landlord shall be entitled to the remaining award; and (iii) if this Lease does not terminate due to such taking or condemnation, Tenant shall be entitled to the award to the extent required for restoration of the Leased Premises, and Landlord shall be entitled to the balance of the award not applied to restoration. If this Lease does not terminate due to a taking or condemnation, Tenant shall, with due diligence, restore the remaining portion or portions of the Leased Premises in the manner provided herein provided Tenant receives sufficient funds from the applicable condemning authority for such purpose. In such event, the proceeds of the award to be applied to restoration shall be deposited with a bank or financial institution designated by Landlord until the restoration has been completed and Tenant has been reimbursed for all the costs and expenses thereof. In addition to the foregoing, Tenant shall have the right to recover from the condemning authority such compensation as is specifically awarded to Tenant to reimburse Tenant for (i) any cost which Tenant may incur in removing Tenant's property from the Leased Premises, and (ii) for loss of Tenant's business.

10. **Insurance**

10.1 ***Liability Insurance Coverage.*** During the Lease Term, Tenant shall maintain commercial general liability insurance coverage with coverage of one million dollars (\$1,000,000) per occurrence, three million dollars (\$3,000,000) aggregate, showing Landlord as an additional insured.

10.2 ***Property Insurance Coverage.*** During the Lease Term, Tenant shall maintain special form property insurance coverage for the full replacement cost of the Facilities and Tenant's Property.

10.3 ***Additional Insurance Requirements.*** Tenant will provide to Landlord a certificate from Tenant's insurer evidencing the coverage required under this Lease. All policies shall be written by carriers licensed to conduct business in the state in which the Leased Premises are located, and no policy shall be subject to cancellation without ten (10) days' prior written notice being given to Landlord.

10.4 ***Waiver of Subrogation.*** Landlord and Tenant mutually waive, as against one another, all rights of recovery for damage sustained by either caused by the other to the extent that the damage is compensated for by insurance maintained by the damaged party, and Landlord and

Tenant agree that no party shall have any claim against the other by way of subrogation or assignment. Landlord and Tenant, to the extent possible, shall obtain policy provisions from their insurers allowing for this waiver.

11. **Indemnity.**

11.1 ***Tenant's Indemnity.*** Tenant shall accept responsibility for any costs, damages, claims, liabilities, expenses (including reasonable attorneys' fees), losses, penalties and court costs suffered by or claimed against Landlord, directly or indirectly, based on or arising out of, (i) the use and occupancy of the Leased Premises by Tenant or Tenant's Permittees, except to the extent that they are caused by Landlord, (ii) any act or omission of Tenant or Tenant's Permittees, except to the extent that they are caused by Landlord, or (iii) any breach of Tenant's obligations under this Lease, including, but not limited to, Tenant's obligation to discharge or bond off liens pursuant to Section 14.7 below.

11.2 ***Landlord's Indemnity.*** Landlord shall accept responsibility for any claim, loss, or damage to the extent arising from the negligence or willful misconduct of Landlord.

12. **Representations & Warranties.**

12.1 ***Landlord Representations.*** Landlord warrants and represents that: (i) Landlord has full power and authority to lease the Leased Premises to Tenant in accordance with the terms of this Lease; (ii) there are no leases or other rights of use or occupancy encumbering the Leased Premises other than as expressly disclosed herein; (iii) Landlord has received no written notice of any pending or threatened legal actions involving the Leased Premises; (iv) this Lease will not violate any agreement to which Landlord is a party or by which it is bound; (v) Landlord is not a Prohibited Person (as defined in Section 12.3 below); (iv) Landlord and the person executing and delivering this Lease on Landlord's behalf represent and warrant that such person(s) is duly authorized to so act; and (v) Landlord is duly organized, is qualified to do business in the jurisdiction in which the Leased Premises is located, is in good standing under the Laws of the state of its organization and the Laws of the jurisdiction in which the Leased Premises is located, and has the power and authority to enter into this Lease, and that all action required to authorize Landlord and such person to enter into this Lease has been duly taken.

12.2 ***Tenant Representations.*** Tenant warrants and represents that (i) Tenant has full power and authority to lease the Leased Premises from Landlord in accordance with the terms of this Lease; (ii) this Lease will not violate any agreement to which Tenant is a party or by which it is bound; (iii) Tenant is not a Prohibited Person (as defined in Section 12.3 below); (iv) Tenant and the person executing and delivering this Lease on Tenant's behalf each represents and warrants that such person is duly authorized to so act; and (v) Tenant is duly organized, is qualified to do business in the jurisdiction in which the Leased Premises is located, is in good standing under the Laws of the state of its organization and the Laws of the jurisdiction in which the Leased Premises is located, and has the power and authority to enter into this Lease, and that all action required to authorize Tenant and such person to enter into this Lease has been duly taken.

12.3 **Prohibited Person.** “**Prohibited Person**” shall mean any person, organization, or entity: (i) listed in the annex to, or is otherwise subject to the provisions of, Executive Order No. 13224 on Terrorist Financing, effective September 24, 2001, and relating to Blocking Property and Prohibiting Transactions With Persons Who Commit, Threaten to Commit, or Support Terrorism (as amended from time to time, the “**Executive Order**”); (ii) owned or controlled by, or acting for or on behalf of, any person or entity that is listed in the annex to, or is otherwise subject to the provisions of, the Executive Order; (iii) with whom a party is prohibited from dealing or otherwise engaging in any transaction by any terrorism or money laundering legal requirements, including the so-called PATRIOT Act and the Executive Order; (iv) that commits, threatens, conspires to commit, or supports “terrorism” as defined in the Executive Order; (v) that is named as a “specifically designated national” or “blocked person” on the most current list published by the U.S. Treasury Department Office of Foreign Assets Control at its official website or at any replacement website or other replacement official publication of the list or is named on any other U.S. or foreign government or regulatory list maintained for the purpose of preventing terrorism, money laundering, or similar activities; (vi) that is covered by any other Law or executive order relating to the imposition of economic sanctions against any country, region, or individual pursuant to United States law or United Nations resolution; or (vii) that is an affiliate (including any principal, officer, immediate family member, or close associate) of a person or entity described in one or more of clauses (i) through (vi) of this definition of Prohibited Person.

13. **Default and Remedies.**

13.1 **Default by Tenant.** The occurrence of any one or more of the following events (each an “**Event of Default**”) shall constitute a breach of this Lease by Tenant: (i) any failure by Tenant to pay any Rent or other charge required to be paid under this Lease if such failure continues for a period of 30 days after Tenant's receipt of notice thereof from Landlord (Tenant may withhold portions of Additional Rent while the same are being audited or contested in good faith and such shall not be deemed to be an Event of Default); (ii) failure to perform any of the covenants of this Lease, other than the timely payment of Tenant’s monetary obligations hereunder, and failure to cure such failure within 60 days after the giving of written notice thereof by Landlord, provided however, that if, by the nature of such agreement or covenant, such failure or breach cannot reasonably be cured within such period of 60 days, an Event of Default shall not exist as long as Tenant commences with due diligence the curing of such failure or breach within such period of 60 days, and, having so commenced, thereafter prosecutes with diligence and completes the curing of such failure or breach; (iii) filing a voluntary petition in bankruptcy court or filing any similar petition seeking relief under any bankruptcy or insolvency statute or law, or if a proceeding under any bankruptcy or insolvency statute or law shall be filed against Tenant or any asset of Tenant, and such proceeding shall not have been dismissed or vacated within 75 days of the date of such filing; (iv) if Tenant shall make an assignment for the benefit of creditors; (v) if any insurance required to be maintained by Tenant pursuant to this Lease shall be cancelled or terminated or shall expire or shall be reduced or materially adversely changed and not corrected by Tenant within 10 business days after written notice from Landlord, except, in each case, as permitted in this Lease; (vi) if Tenant shall abandon the Leased Premises (except that the foregoing shall not constitute an Event of Default if, prior to vacating the Leased Premises, Tenant has made arrangements reasonably acceptable to Landlord to (1) ensure that Tenant’s insurance for the Leased Premises

will not be voided or cancelled with respect to the Leased Premises as a result of such vacancy, (2) ensure that the Leased Premises is secured and not subject to vandalism, and (3) ensure that the Leased Premises will be properly maintained after such vacation); (vii) if Tenant shall attempt or there shall occur any assignment, subleasing or other transfer of Tenant's interest in or with respect to this Lease except as otherwise permitted in this Lease; or (viii) if Tenant shall fail to discharge any lien placed upon the Leased Premises in violation of this Lease within 60 days after Tenant receives notice of the filing of any such lien or encumbrance.

13.2 Landlord's Remedies. Upon the occurrence of an Event of Default by Tenant, Landlord may, at its option, pursue any one or more of the following remedies without any additional notice or demand:

13.2.1 Landlord may, at its option, initially or at any time thereafter, terminate this Lease by written notice to Tenant, whereupon this Lease shall end. Upon such termination by Landlord, Tenant shall at once peaceably surrender possession of the Leased Premises to Landlord and remove all of Tenant's personal property therefrom, and Landlord may reenter the Leased Premises, repossess such premises, and remove all persons and personal property therefrom. In conjunction with re-entering the Leased Premises, Landlord may at its sole option (and not obligation) take assignment of any contracts, permits, licenses, or other instruments relating to Tenant's Work, and may complete such Tenant's Work at Tenant's expense, subject to the Tenant Allowance in accordance with Section 4.3.

13.2.2 In addition to all other legal and equitable remedies available to Landlord, Landlord shall also have the right to take such actions as reasonably necessary to cure Tenant's default, or in Landlord's reasonable judgment, to protect and secure the Leased Premises and any Improvements thereon without being deemed in any manner guilty of trespass, eviction or forcible entry and detainer and without incurring any liability for any damage or interruption of Tenant's business resulting therefrom.

13.2.3 Any and all rights and remedies Landlord may have under this Lease, and at law and equity, shall be cumulative and shall not be deemed inconsistent with each other, and any two or more of all such rights and remedies may be exercised at the same time insofar as permitted by law. Nothing contained in this Lease shall, however, limit or prejudice the right of Landlord to prove and obtain in proceedings for bankruptcy or insolvency by reason of the termination of this Lease, an amount equal to the maximum allowed by any statute or rule of law in effect at the time when and governing the proceedings in which the damages are to be proved, whether such amount be greater, equal to, or less than the amount of the loss or damages referred to in the preceding Sections. Any law, usage, or custom to the contrary notwithstanding, Landlord shall have the right at all times to enforce the provisions of this Lease in strict accordance with the terms hereof; and the failure of Landlord at any time to enforce its rights under this Lease strictly in accordance with same shall not be construed as having created a custom in any way or manner contrary to the specific terms, provisions, and covenants of this Lease or as having modified the same. Tenant and Landlord further agree that forbearance or waiver by Landlord to enforce its rights pursuant to this Lease or at law or in equity, shall not be a waiver of Landlord's right to enforce one (1) or more of its rights in connection with any

subsequent default. A receipt by Landlord of Rent or other payment with knowledge of the breach of any covenant hereof shall not be deemed a waiver of such breach, and no waiver by Landlord of any provision of this Lease shall be deemed to have been made unless expressed in writing and signed by Landlord. To the greatest extent permitted by law, Tenant waives the service of notice of Landlord's intention to re-enter as provided for in any statute, or to institute legal proceedings to that end, and also waives all right of redemption in case Tenant shall be dispossessed by a judgment or by warrant of any court or judge. The terms "enter," "re-enter," "entry" or "re-entry," as used in this Lease, are not restricted to their technical legal meanings. Any reletting of the Premises shall be on such terms and conditions as Landlord in its sole discretion may determine (including without limitation a term different than the remaining Lease Term, rental concessions, alterations and repair of the Leased Premises, or lease of less than the entire Leased Premises to any tenant). Landlord shall not be liable, nor shall Tenant's obligations hereunder be diminished because of, Landlord's failure to relet the Premises or collect rent due in respect of such reletting.

13.2.4 If Landlord terminates this Lease or Tenant's right to possession, Landlord shall use reasonable efforts to mitigate, which need not exceed such efforts as Landlord or its affiliates generally use to lease other space at properties owned or managed by Landlord or its affiliates.

13.3 ***Default by Landlord.*** In the event of any default by Landlord, Tenant shall provide Landlord written notice specifying such default with particularity. If Landlord does not cure such default within 60 days after written notice, or if such default cannot reasonably be cured within 60 days if Landlord does not commence efforts to cure within such 60 days or does not thereafter diligently pursue same through completion, Tenant may, in addition to any and all other remedies available hereunder or at law or equity, cure such default on Landlord's behalf and Landlord shall reimburse Tenant for its documented, out-of-pocket expenses incurred in doing so within 60 days after written demand. In no event shall Landlord be liable for any indirect, consequential or punitive damages. Nothing contained herein shall relieve Tenant of its obligations under this Section if the destruction or damage is not covered, either in whole or in part, by Tenant's insurance policies.

14. **Additional Material Provisions.**

14.1 ***Assignment & Subletting.*** Tenant shall not assign, sublet or otherwise transfer, whether voluntarily or involuntarily or by operation of law, the Leased Premises or any part thereof without Landlord's prior written approval, which approval shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed.

14.2 ***Notices.*** Every notice, demand or request (collectively "**Notice**") required hereunder or by law to be given by either party to the other must be given in writing by (a) personal delivery, (b) reputable overnight delivery service with proof of delivery, (c) United States Mail, postage prepaid, registered or certified mail, return receipt requested, or (d) for Notices given prior to the Commencement Date, email transmission. A Notice sent in accordance with the foregoing

is deemed to be given on the day that such Notice is sent or transmitted, and is deemed to be received on the day such Notice is actually received, on the first attempted delivery or acceptance of delivery is refused, as applicable. Every Notice must be sent, delivered, or emailed (but only if sent prior to the Commencement Date), as applicable, to the intended addressee at the primary address set forth in the Specific Provisions, or to such other address or to the attention of such other Person as the addressee shall have designated by written notice sent in accordance herewith. Notices shall also be sent to the “with copy to” addressees set forth in the Specific Provisions, provided, however, that delivery to such addressees *alone* does not constitute compliance with this Section 14.2.

14.3 Subordination. Provided that Tenant has received a commercially reasonable subordination, non-disturbance agreement, Tenant agrees that this Lease shall be subordinate to any deeds of trust, deeds to secure debt, mortgages or similar financing instruments that may now exist or in the future, may be placed upon the Leased Premises, to any and all advances made or to be made under them, and to the interest on all obligations secured by the Leased Premises, and to all renewals, replacements, and extensions of them; however, for this subordination to be effective, the beneficiary or mortgagee in any deeds or mortgages must first have executed a commercially reasonable subordination, attornment and non-disturbance agreement. Tenant hereby agrees that it approves of, and will execute a commercially reasonable subordination, attornment and non-disturbance. If any beneficiary makes a written election to have this Lease superior to its deed of trust or mortgage and gives notice of its election to Tenant, then this Lease shall be superior to the lien of any applicable deed of trust or mortgage, whether this Lease is dated before or after the deed of trust or mortgage. Tenant waives the provisions of any statute or rule of law now or hereafter in effect which may give or purport to give Tenant any right to terminate or otherwise adversely affect this Lease and Tenant’s obligations hereunder in the event any foreclosure proceeding is prosecuted or completed or in the event the Leased Premises or Landlord’s interest therein is transferred by foreclosure, by deed in lieu of foreclosure or otherwise. At the request of such transferee and assumption of Landlord’s obligations as required hereby, Tenant shall attorn to such transferee and shall recognize such transferee as the landlord under this Lease. Tenant agrees that upon any such attornment, such transferee shall not be (a) bound by or required to credit Tenant with any prepayment of the Base Rent or Additional Rent more than thirty (30) days in advance or any deposit, rental security or any other sums deposited with any prior landlord under the Lease (including Landlord) unless said sum is actually received by such transferee, (b) bound by any amendment, modification or termination of this Lease made without the consent of the holder of each mortgage existing as of the date of such amendment, (c) liable for any breach, act or omission of any prior landlord under the Lease (including Landlord) or any damages arising therefrom; (d) subject to any offsets or defenses which Tenant might have against any prior landlord (including Landlord), (e) liable for any tenant improvement work to the Leased Premises commenced or agreed to by any prior landlord under the Lease (including Landlord), (f) liable for payment of any damages, fees or penalties payable by any landlord under the Lease (including Landlord) to Tenant, or (g) bound by any obligation which may appear in this Lease to pay any sum of money to Tenant; provided, however, that after succeeding to Landlord’s interest under this Lease, such transferee shall agree to perform in accordance with the terms of this Lease all obligations of Landlord arising after the date of transfer. Within ten (10) days after the request of such transferee, Tenant shall execute, acknowledge and deliver any requisite or appropriate document submitted to Tenant confirming such attornment.

14.4 ***Estoppel Certificates.*** Landlord or Tenant shall at any time and from time to time, upon not less than thirty (30) days' prior written notice from the other, execute and deliver a statement to the requesting party and their designee (i.e., lender, potential purchaser, subtenant, etc.) in writing, in a form reasonably acceptable to the other, certifying to the other that this Lease is unmodified and in full force and effect (or, if there have been modifications, that the Lease has been modified and is in full force and effect as so modified), and the dates to which any Base Rent or Additional Rent and any other charges or payments have been paid in advance, whether the Lease has been assigned and/or the Leased Premises sublet, and any other factual statements typically required of a landlord or tenant (as applicable) in a similar commercial transaction so long as such statements do not modify this Lease or increase Tenant's obligations or liabilities under this Lease; provided, however, that in no event shall Tenant be required to certify that it or the Leased Premises is compliance with any federal, state or local laws, regulations, ordinances or rules. Any statement delivered pursuant to the prior sentence may be relied upon by the requesting party.

14.5 ***Memorandum of Lease.*** Landlord and Tenant agree that this Lease shall not be recorded. Notwithstanding the foregoing, Landlord and Tenant shall execute and deliver and cause to be recorded in the land records of the county where the Leased Premises is located, and at Tenant's cost, a Memorandum of Lease in substantially the form attached hereto as **Exhibit "C"**, indicating the existence of the Lease with respect to the Leased Premises and other matters reasonably requested by the requesting party.

14.6 ***Quiet Enjoyment; Inspection.*** So long as Tenant is not in material default under the terms and conditions of this Lease, Tenant may peaceably and quietly enjoy the Leased Premises during the Lease Term.

14.7 ***Mechanics' or Other Liens.*** If, because of any act or omission of Tenant or anyone claiming by, through, or under Tenant, any mechanic's lien or other lien shall be filed against the Leased Premises, Tenant shall, at its own expense, cause the same to be discharged of record or (by payment or bonding in accordance with applicable law) within thirty (30) days after the date of filing thereof. Tenant's obligations to discharge or bond off any and all liens filed against the Leased Premises will survive the expiration or earlier termination of this Lease.

14.8 ***Consent/Duty to Act Reasonably.*** Any time the consent of Landlord or Tenant is required under the Lease, the consent shall not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed, unless a different standard for review or response is specified in the Lease. Whenever the Lease grants Landlord or Tenant the right to take action, exercise discretion, establish rules and regulations, or make allocations or other determinations, Landlord and Tenant shall act in a commercially reasonable manner and take no action that might result in the frustration of the reasonable expectations of a sophisticated landlord and sophisticated tenant concerning the benefits to be enjoyed under the Lease. Landlord and Tenant further covenant to take all further actions reasonably requested by the other to effectuate the provisions of this Lease.

14.9 ***Management Agreement.*** Landlord and Tenant agree that Landlord, or a designated affiliate of Landlord (the "***Manager***"), shall provide management services and clinical services to clients served by Tenant at the Leased Premises for the entire Term of this Lease in accordance with the provisions of a separate management agreement (the "***Management***").

Agreement”) to be agreed upon and executed by the parties no later than the first anniversary of the Effective Date. Landlord agrees to cause Manager to deliver an initial draft of the Management Agreement to Tenant no later than sixty (60) days after the Effective Date.² Notwithstanding anything herein to the contrary, the Management Agreement shall provide Tenant with certain rights in the event of material default by the Manager as are expressly described in the Management Agreement for replacement of the Manager. Landlord has the right to approve any Manager appointed by Tenant after the removal or resignation of the initial Manager in accordance with the Management Agreement, which approval should not be unreasonably withheld, conditioned or delayed. Any subsequent Management Agreement or Manager shall remain subject to the terms of this Lease as provided herein.

15. General Conditions.

15.1 ***Cancellation of Previous Agreements.*** This Lease cancels and supersedes, as of the Commencement Date, any lease or other written agreement (including letters of intent) of prior date between the parties or their predecessors in interest on or with reference to the possession of the Leased Premises and covers all the covenants, stipulations, and provisions agreed upon by the parties. No employee, agent, or representative of Tenant has authority to change, modify, or alter the terms of this Lease, except by written instrument executed upon and with the same authority as this Lease, and neither party is or will be bound by any inducement, statement, representation, promise, or agreement not contained in this Lease or as a proper amendment.

15.2 ***Binding Effect.*** This Lease shall not be binding upon Landlord or Tenant until Landlord and Tenant both shall have executed and delivered the Lease.

15.3 ***Interpretation.*** The language in all parts of this Lease shall be construed according to its normal and usual meaning, and not strictly for or against either Landlord or Tenant. If there is any claim of ambiguity in or dispute regarding the meaning of the language of the Lease, Landlord and Tenant shall be deemed to have jointly drafted this Lease and each provision so that the Lease shall not be construed against either party as the drafter. Prior drafts of this Lease or of any disputed provision shall have no effect in construing this Lease or any provision.

15.4 ***Severability.*** Landlord and Tenant covenant and agree that, if any term, covenant, condition, provision, or agreement of this Lease is held to be invalid or void by any court of competent jurisdiction, the invalidity of any term, condition, covenant, provisions, or agreement shall not affect any other term, covenant, condition, provision, or agreement in this Lease.

15.5 ***Singular/Plural.*** Whenever the singular is used in this Lease as required by the context, the reference shall include the plural, and the masculine gender shall include the feminine and neuter genders, and the word “**person**” shall include corporation, firm or association.

15.6 **Headings.** The marginal headings or titles to the Sections of this Lease are not part of this Lease and shall have no effect upon the construction or interpretation of any part of this Lease.

15.7 **Entire Agreement & No Oral Modification.** This instrument, including all attached exhibits, contains all of the agreements and conditions made between the parties to this Lease and may not be modified orally or in any other manner other than by an agreement in writing signed by Landlord and Tenant or their respective successors in interest.

15.8 **Successors & Assigns.** Subject to the terms and conditions of Section 14.1 above, the terms and provisions of this Lease shall be binding upon and inure to the benefit the heirs, executors, administrators, successors, and assigns of Landlord and Tenant.

15.9 **No Third-Party Beneficiaries.** Nothing in this Lease, whether expressed or implied, is intended to confer any rights or remedies under or by reason of this Lease on any person (including without limitation any broker, finder, or agent of either party) other than the parties to this Lease and their respective successors and assigns, if any, nor shall any provision in this Lease give any third parties the right of subrogation or action against any party to this Lease.

15.10 **Authority to Execute.** Landlord and Tenant covenant that each individual executing this Lease by and on behalf of the party is a person duly authorized to execute this Lease for that party and bind the party according to the terms of this Lease.

15.11 **Force Majeure.** Neither party shall be required to perform any term, covenant, or condition of this Lease so long as the performance or bargained for benefit under this Lease is delayed or prevented by “**Force Majeure Events**” constituting any acts of God, strike, lockout, material or labor shortage or restriction, civil riot, enemy action, war, acts of terrorism, pandemic, epidemic, civil commotion, moratorium, actions of a Governing Authority, and any other cause not reasonably within the control of the party and which by the exercise of due diligence the party is unable, wholly or in part, to prevent or overcome. The occurrence of a Force Majeure Event will extend day-to-day the relevant date in question but only if, within ten (10) business days after the end of the event causing the delay, the party seeking the delay notices the other party in writing of the nature of the cause for the delay and the actual extension requested. For the avoidance of doubt, the foregoing shall apply to and extend any period of time set forth in this Agreement regarding the Construction Period.

15.12 **Governing Law.** This Lease and all of its provisions shall be construed in accordance with the laws of the state of Ohio. Any legal proceeding relating in any way to this Lease may only be brought in the forum in Lorain County, Ohio.

15.13 **No Waiver.** The waiver by Landlord or Tenant of any violation on the part of the other shall not be construed as a waiver of any subsequent violations.

15.14 **Counterparts.** This Lease and any amendments may be executed in any number of original or telecopy counterparts, each of which will be effective on delivery and all of which together will constitute one binding agreement of the parties. Any signature page of the Lease may be detached from any executed counterpart of the Lease without impairing the legal effect of

any signatures and may be attached to another counterpart of the Lease that is identical in form to the document signed (but that has attached to it one or more additional signature pages).

15.15 *Dispute Resolution.*

15.15.1 In the event of any dispute arising out of or relating to this Lease or the breach thereof, the parties shall use their best efforts to settle the dispute by direct negotiations between the parties. If the dispute is not settled promptly through negotiation, the parties shall submit the dispute to mediation under the then-applicable Mediation Rules of the American Arbitration Association. The parties to the dispute shall share equally the mediator's fees and any administrative fee, but shall otherwise bear their own expenses.

15.15.2 In the event that the parties have been unable to resolve any dispute arising out of or relating to this Lease, or the breach thereof, despite best efforts and good faith by the parties, then either party may seek relief in a court of competent jurisdiction.

15.15.3 LANDLORD AND TENANT HEREBY KNOWINGLY, VOLUNTARILY AND INTENTIONALLY WAIVE THE RIGHT EITHER MAY HAVE TO A TRIAL BY JURY IN RESPECT OF ANY LITIGATION BASED HEREON OR ARISING OUT OF, UNDER OR IN CONNECTION WITH THIS LEASE AND ANY AGREEMENT CONTEMPLATED TO BE EXECUTED IN CONJUNCTION HERewith, OR ANY COURSE OF CONDUCT, COURSE OF DEALING, STATEMENTS (WHETHER VERBAL OR WRITTEN) OR ACTIONS OF EITHER PARTY. THIS PROVISION IS A MATERIAL INDUCEMENT FOR THE PARTIES TO ENTER INTO THIS LEASE.

15.16 *Calculation of Time Periods.* Should the calculation of any of the various time periods provided for herein result in an obligation becoming due on a day occurring on a Saturday, Sunday or U.S. Federal Reserve Bank holiday, then the due date of such obligation or scheduled time of occurrence of such event shall be delayed until the next business day. For purposes of calculating additional time periods following such due date, any such extended time period shall thereafter be deemed to have expired on the extended due date, and not the due date of original expiration before taking into account the weekend or legal holiday. As used herein, if a day is to be considered a "calendar day" (any day of the week, month or year) unless otherwise specified as a "business day" (the days between and including Monday to Friday and not including public holidays and weekends).

15.17 *Provisions Constituting Sublease.*

15.17.1 This Lease is subject to and subordinate in all terms and conditions of the Master Lease and to any and all liens, encumbrances and/or other matters to which the Master Lease may be subject and subordinate in accordance with its terms. Tenant shall not commit or permit to be committed on the Leased Premises any act or omission which would violate any term or condition of the Master Lease. Landlord shall cause Master Lessor to obtain a recognition agreement from Master Lessor of this Lease in the form as attached hereto as **Exhibit "D"**.

15.17.2 In the event of the termination of Landlord's interest as "Lessee" under the Master Lease for any reason and Landlord's rights under the Master Lease, either in relation to the Leased Premises or in relation to the Master Lease, then this Lease shall terminate concurrently therewith without any liability of Landlord to Tenant.

15.17.3 Tenant acknowledges and agrees that (a) this Lease is subject to the Master Lease and that Tenant has read the Master Lease and accepts the terms thereof, (b) Tenant will not authorize or execute any act, deed or thing whatsoever or fail to take any such action which will or may cause Landlord to be in violation of any of its obligations under the Master Lease, (c) Tenant shall give to Master Lessor, at the address and otherwise in the manner specified in the Master Lease, a copy of any notice of default by Landlord as the landlord under this Lease at the same time as, and whenever, any such notice of default shall be given by the Tenant to Landlord, (d) to the extent allowed by applicable law Tenant hereby grants to Master Lessor a security interest in all of its right, title and interest in the licenses and the provider agreements and any certificates of need, and in their tangible and intangible personal property, accounts receivables and deposit accounts, subject to the terms of the Master Lease; (e) all of the representations, warranties and covenants given by Landlord to Master Lessor under the Master Lease are hereby made and given by Tenant for the benefit of Master Lessor, its successors and assigns; (f) Tenant and Landlord shall not alter, amend, modify, surrender, cancel or terminate this Lease or assign its/their rights or delegate its/their duties thereunder, without Master Lessor's prior written consent, pursuant to the terms and conditions of the Master Lease; and (g) notwithstanding any provision of this Lease to the contrary, but subject to the terms of the Recognition Agreement, the Tenant agrees that Master Lessor shall not be: (i) liable for any act or omission of the Landlord under this Lease; (ii) subject to any offsets or defenses which the Tenant may have against the Landlord; (iii) bound by any payment of rent or other sums made by the Tenant for any advance period under this Lease for more than one (1) month; (iv) bound by any security deposits which the Tenant might have paid to the Landlord or any other party, or (v) bound by any amendment or modification of this Lease made the Master Lessor's prior written consent, which may be withheld in the sole and absolute discretion of Master Lessor;

15.17.4 In no event shall the Lease Term of this Lease extend beyond the term of the Master Lease.

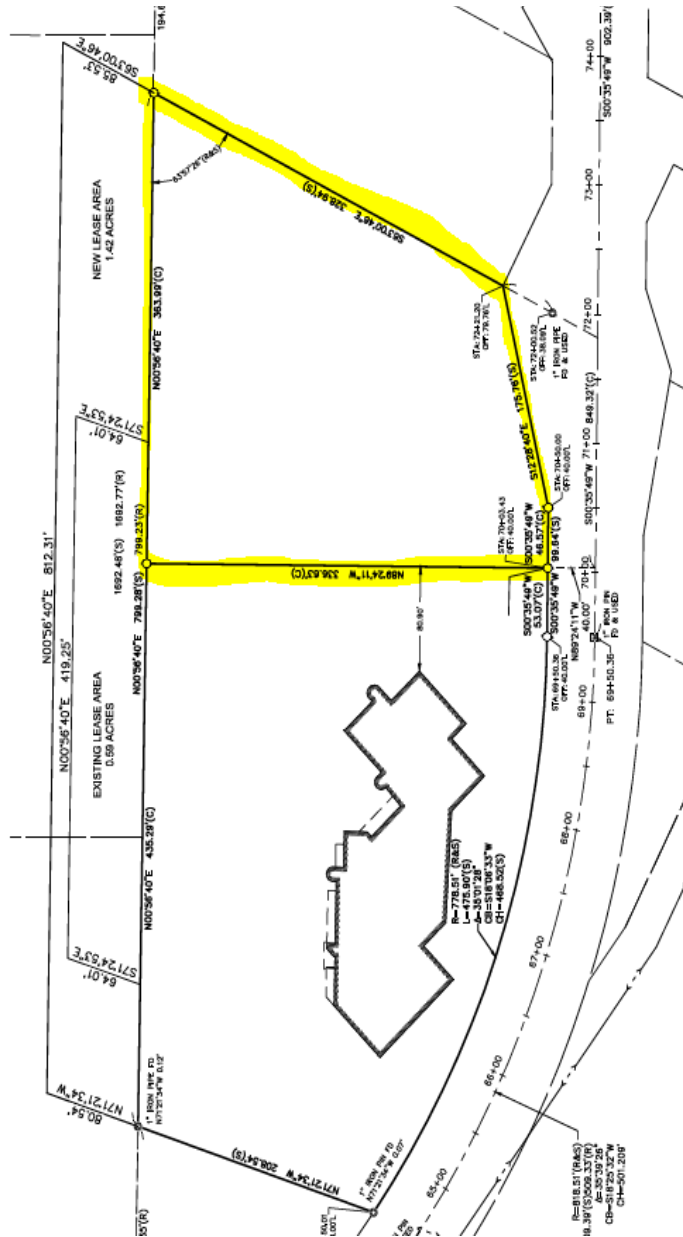

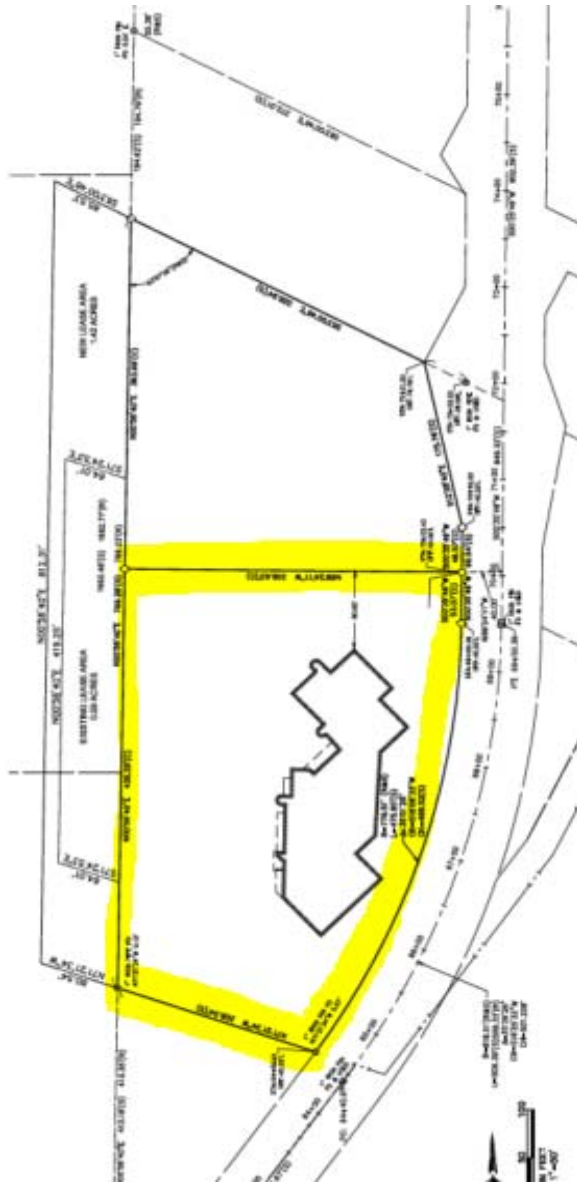

RECOGNITION AGREEMENT

THIS RECOGNITION AGREEMENT (“Agreement”) entered in as of _____ 2023 (the “Execution Date”) and made effective as of the Effective Date of the Sublease (the “Effective Date”) by and between NORCARE ENTERPRISES, INC. (the “Master Lessor”), THE NORD CENter (“Nord”), and MENTAL HEALTH AND ADDICTION RECOVERY SERVICES BOARD OF LORAIN COUNTY (the “Tenant”).

RECITALS

A. Pursuant to that certain Lease Agreement dated as of **November 1, 2023** (as the same may be amended and modified from time to time, collectively, “Master Lease”) between Master Lessor, as lessor, and Nord, as lessee, leased to Nord that certain real property in Lorain County, Ohio and all rights and appurtenances thereto and improvements thereon (collectively, the “Master Lease Property”), which Property is more particularly described on **Exhibit A** attached hereto and made a part hereof.

B. Pursuant to that certain Ground Sublease dated as of **November 1, 2023** (as the same may be amended and modified from time to time, collectively, the “Sublease”), Nord leased a portion of the Master Lease Property to Tenant (the “Property”), which Property is more particularly described on **Exhibit B** attached hereto and made a part hereof.

NOW, THEREFORE, in consideration of the foregoing and for other good and valuable consideration, the receipt and sufficiency of which is hereby acknowledged, Master Lessor, Nord, and Tenant agree as follows:

1. **Representations.** Master Lessor represents to Tenant that, as of the Effective Date: (i) it is the fee simple owner of the Property; (ii) the Master Lease is in full force and effect; and (iii) to Master Lessor’s knowledge, Nord is not in default under the Master Lease, nor has any event occurred which would, after notice to Nord and the passage of time become a default of Nord under the Master Lease.

2. **Consent.** Subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Master Lessor hereby consents to the subleasing of the Property by Nord to Tenant pursuant to the Sublease.

3. **Recognition.** So long as Tenant fully and faithfully performs its obligations in accordance with the terms and provisions of the Sublease, beyond the lapse of any applicable notice and cure periods, Tenant’s right to remain in possession of the Property and to enjoy the Property until the termination or earlier expiration of the Sublease shall remain undisturbed and without interference whatsoever from the Master Lessor. Master Lessor hereby recognizes

Tenant's right to use, possess and enjoy the Property pursuant to the Sublease as being a valid and enforceable right. If Nord defaults under the Master Lease and as a result thereof is no longer entitled to use, possess and enjoy the Property on account thereof or if the Master Lease is terminated for any reason, then, subject to the terms and conditions of this Agreement, Master Lessor shall be substituted for Nord in the Sublease and thereafter, the terms and provisions of the Sublease shall govern and control Tenant's use and occupancy of the Property, and Master Lessor shall assume all of Nord's obligations thereafter arising under, and be entitled to all benefits of Nord provided further, however, that, with respect to the forgoing, nothing shall increase the obligations of Nord under the Master Lease.

4. Notifications. Master Lessor agrees that they shall notify Tenant of any amendment or modification of the Master Lease. Master Lessor also agrees to provide a copy to Tenant of any notice of default sent to Nord under the Mater Lease.

5. Direct Lease/Attornment by Sublessee. Master Lessor acknowledges that if the Master Lease terminates for any reason that is not on account of an event of default thereunder caused by Tenant, so long as there does not then exist an Event of Default (as defined in the Sublease) under the Sublease, Tenant shall not be made a party in any removal or eviction action or proceeding, nor shall Tenant be evicted or removed of its possession of the Premises and, subject to the terms of Section 3 above, the Sublease shall then become a direct lease between Master Lessor and Tenant in accordance with its terms without the necessity of executing any further instrument. In such event, Tenant shall attorn to Master Lessor, and, subject to the terms of Section 3 above, Master Lessor shall be substituted in the place of Nord in the Sublease.

Notices shall also be sent to the "with copy to" addressees set forth in below, provided, however, that delivery to such addressees *alone* does not constitute compliance with this Section 6.

Dear Mr. Doud:

On October 10, 2023 bids were opened for the General Contractor on the above referenced project. Six bids were received, and those bids have been summarized on the attached bid tabulation. The apparent low bidder is **Panzica Construction Company** of Mayfield Village, OH. Panzica's bid is summarized as follows:

Base Bid	\$13,855,044.00
Alternate 1 – Call Center Build-Out	\$104,599.00
Alternate 2 – Rooms 15, 16 Build-Out	\$91,005.00
Alternate C – Additional Paving	\$79,500.00
Total	\$14,130,148.00

Panzica's bid was \$2,786,724.00 or 16.5% below the published estimate of \$16,916,872.00. In accordance with the Bid Documents and Lorain County requirements, award should be made to the lowest responsive and responsible bidders, so Hill has performed an analysis of Panzica's bid to determine if it was responsive and if Panzica is a responsible bidder.

A responsive bid would be one which is complete and contains no material defects, which would be irregularities or deviations from the bid specifications that would affect the amount of the bid or otherwise give the bidder a competitive advantage.

Regarding Panzica's bid, Hill has reviewed the documents that Panzica provided with their bid, as well as supplemental clarifying information provided on October 18, 2023, October 24, 2023, October 31, 2023, and November 1, 2023, and finds them to be responsive. Specifically:

1. Panzica's bid was submitted to the correct location before the bid deadline.
2. Panzica provided a complete and signed proposal form with all Addendum properly acknowledged.
3. Panzica's bid has no written exceptions or clarifications.
4. Panzica's bid and clarifying supplemental information includes all required information.
5. Panzica has provided a bid guarantee as required by Ohio Revised Code (ORC) 153.54.
6. Panzica has provided affidavits from vendors in the Ohio EDGE program indicating participation of \$833,890 or 5.9% of their bid which exceeds the ORC 340.13 required goal of 5% for this project.

The evaluation of the responsibility of the bidder is outlined in ORC 9.312, which provides the following factors:

1. The experience of the bidder.
2. The bidder's financial condition.
3. The bidder's conduct and performance on previous contracts.
4. The bidder's facilities and management skills.
5. The bidder's ability to execute the contract properly.

In addition, ORC 9.312 allows public agencies to adopt resolutions or ordinances that provide other specific criteria to utilize when evaluating the responsiveness of a bidder. Lorain County had adopted such a resolution in the form of Resolution 15-283 which was adopted on May 6, 2015. The bid documents contain two questionnaires that each bidder is required to complete to demonstrate their compliance with Resolution 15-283. A copy of Panzica's completed questionnaire including supplemental information provided on October 18, 2023, October 24, 2023, October 31, 2023, and November 1, 2023, is attached. Please note that Panzica did provide certified financial information as required, but it is not included as it is considered confidential and not a public record under ORC 9.312 and 149.43. It is available for review upon request.

There are two items on Panzica's questionnaire that we would like to point out. The first is a request for Panzica to demonstrate via its example projects an ability to self-perform 30% of the contract value. The example projects Panzica provided show between 18% and 20% self performance. In supplemental information, Panzica clarified that its self-performance percentage can be influenced by specific specialty items that may be included in a project that it cannot self-perform, as well as its ability to obtain lower pricing from subcontractors than its own internal self-performing trades. Panzica also provided additional project examples that have a higher self-performance of 27% and 31%. It is Hill's opinion that Panzica has adequately demonstrated its ability to self-perform on the project as required which will ensure adequate stake from their own trades in the project's success.

The second is the fact that Panzica did not certify that they would provide 20% non-Caucasian and 15% women as a part of their workforce for the project. Panzica provided supplemental information showing recent project examples that averaged 19.2 % non-Caucasian and 4.95% women in the project workforce. They provided additional clarification that they do not feel the specified goal is achievable due to the make-up of the available workforce, particularly regarding the availability of women. They documented their efforts to continue to provide a good-faith effort to diversify their workforce. It should be noted that Resolution 15-283 specifically allows this diversity goal to be reduced if a good-faith effort is demonstrated. It would be Hill's recommendation that Panzica's documentation be accepted if they continue to demonstrate a good-faith effort to diversify their workforce throughout the project.

After a full review of Panzica's documentation, it is Hill's opinion that Panzica is a responsible bidder and has the experience, financial condition, previous experience, facilities, and management skills to be able to properly execute the project. We have also attached a letter from Perspectus Architecture making a recommendation to award to Panzica.

As a result, it is Hill's recommendation that Panzica Construction Company be declared the lowest responsive and responsible bidder and be awarded the Lorain County Crisis Receiving Center Project in the amount of \$14, 130,148.00.

Experience- Projects don't demonstrate 30% self-performance:

The projects that we provided, were recently completed projects that met the criteria of the size, complexity, with higher contract amounts. The two main factors of why these projects did not meet the 30% self-performance requirements are:

1. Each project the owner required that all scopes of work require a minimum of 3 (three) responsive bidders for each scope of work. Panzica Construction bid out all the scopes of work as required but was not the successful lowest bidder for all the scopes of work we would self-perform. Our bid tab response sheet for the Lorain County Crisis indicates we were not the lowest bidder for the CFMF, Metal Studs, Drywall and Interior Ceiling on this project.
2. Each of the listed projects had scopes of work or building elements that increased the cost of the projects which need to be performed by certified installers for those scopes of work.
 - a. Brooklyn City Center had jail detention equipment, security ceilings, detention security system and controls.
 - b. The Cleveland Museum of Natural History the project had delegated design of a very expressive and intricate building envelope, which included GFRC and FRP panels. It also included custom acoustical plaster.
 - c. The Cleveland Foundation utilized an integrated mass timber and structural steel frame.

Two projects we are currently working on are, The Streetsboro Community Center and The Cuyahoga County Public Library Brooklyn Branch, Panzica Construction was low bidder for multiply scopes of work and will be self-performing 34.1% to 27.8% of each project.

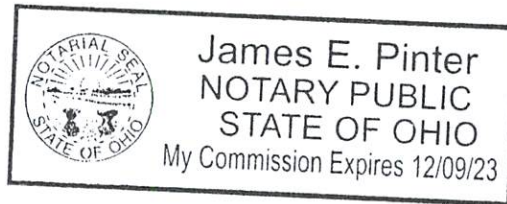

ESTIMATED QUANTITIES

The attention of every bidder is called to the fact that the quantities given in the Proposal are approximate only, and are intended to serve as a uniform basis for the comparison of bids. The MHARS Board believes the quantities given to be essentially correct, but no guaranties are made of their accuracy. If the Contractor relies upon the accuracy of the estimated quantities in making up his bid, he does so at his own risk.

The MHARS Board reserves the right to increase, decrease, or omit the amount of any class or portion of the work during the progress of construction.

EXAMINATION OF SITE AND PLANS

Bidders shall satisfy themselves by personal examination of the Contract documents and investigation at the site of the work as to the conditions existing, and the difficulties likely to be encountered in the performance and completion of the work.

They shall acquaint themselves with the facilities existing and needed for the transportation, handling, and storage of equipment and materials, and with the roads giving access to the site and shipping facilities available.

SUBCONTRACT

To determine the qualification of bidders, all bids must state, in writing, the scope of work each subcontractor is to do, his place of business, telephone number, and such other information as may be required in order to ascertain whether such subcontractor is responsible, reliable, and able to perform the work as called for in the specifications. No bid will be accepted if the Subcontractor's list is not submitted along with the Proposal form at the time of the bid opening. The Contractor shall not sublet any part of the work included in this contract without the previous written consent of the Owner. Subletting, if permitted, shall not relieve the Contractor of any of his obligations under this contract.

The Bidder shall provide evidence acceptable to the Board of the Bidder's participation in the EDGE Program by contracting with EDGE-certified Business Enterprise(s) for the Project by submitting a fully completed EDGE Affidavit for each EDGE-certified Business Enterprise, by requesting a waiver or partial waiver of the advertised EDGE Program participation goal for the Project on the Bidder's company letterhead including full documentation of the Bidder's good faith effort to contract with EDGE-certified Business Enterprise(s) for this Project, or both.

TAX EXEMPTION

In as much as the Contractor is doing work of the Board, and all materials furnished shall be incorporated into and become the property of the MHARS Board of Lorain County, the Contractor hereunder will be freed from assuming or paying any tax that is set by Amended Bill No. 572 or by Amended Bill No. 590, First Special Session of the 901st General Assembly of Ohio, December 13, 1935.

CONTRACT

The bidder to whom the award is made will be required to execute a written contract with the MHARS Board of Lorain County within ten days after receiving such contract for execution. The contract shall be in the form given in the Contract Documents.

If the bidder to whom the award is made fails to enter into a contract as herein provided, the Board may award the contract to the next lowest bidder. The bidder and/or surety failing to enter into the contract are then liable for the lesser amount of:

- ☐ The difference between his bid and the next lowest bid, or a sum not more than 10% of the bid.

As an alternative, the Board may resubmit the public improvement project for bidding. If this is done, the bidder and/or surety must then pay the Board the lesser amount of either:

If any prospective bidder for the work proposed herein is in doubt as to the true meaning of any part of the Contract Documents, he may submit to MHARS Board of Lorain County a written request for an interpretation thereof. An interpretation will be made by MHARS Board and an Addendum will be issued and e-mailed or delivered to each person taking out a set of Contract Documents. The MHARS Board of Lorain County will not be responsible for any interpretation of the Contract Documents except as provided herein.

NON-COMPLIANCE

Non-compliance with the foregoing requirements may cause the Proposal to be rejected, as not complying with the law.

GENERAL PROVISIONS

DEFINITIONS AND TERMS

THE BOARD

This term, wherever used herein, shall mean the Mental Health Addiction & Recovery Services Board of Lorain County, acting through its authorized representative.

OWNER'S REPRESENTATIVE

This term, wherever used herein, shall mean Hill International, Inc., acting through its authorized representative.

ARCHITECT

This term, wherever used herein, shall mean Perspectus Architecture, acting through its authorized representative.

BIDDER

This term, wherever used herein, shall mean that person, firm, or corporation undertaking this contract, acting directly or through a duly authorized representative.

CONTRACTOR

This term, wherever used herein, shall mean that person, firm, or corporation undertaking this contract, acting directly or through a duly authorized representative.

SUPERINTENDENT

Is the person who is the executive representative of the Contractor, present on the work site at all times during its progress, authorized to receive and fulfill instructions from the Engineer, and capable of directing the work efficiently.

PLANS

The plans are the official working drawings, or exact reproductions thereof, approved by the Board which show the location, character, dimensions, and details of the work to be done, and which are to be considered as part of the contract, supplementary to these specifications.

SPECIFICATIONS

The Specifications are the directions, provisions, and requirements contained herein pertaining to the method and manner of performing the work, or the quantities of materials to be furnished under the Contract. The "Standard Construction and Material Specifications" of the Ohio Department of Transportation, in effect as of the date of the Proposal, are incorporated within the specifications mentioned in the Contract Documents as full and completely as if attached thereto, and made a part thereof, unless otherwise shown.

CONTRACT

The Contract is the written agreement covering the performance of the work and the furnishing of labor and materials in the construction of the work. The Contract shall include the Notice to Contractors, the Proposal, Plans, Specifications, Special Provisions, Contract Bond, and the Auditor's Certificate, and other documents required to complete this document.

THE WORK

The work is all work specified herein or indicated on the Plans and Specifications of the contemplated improvement covered by the Contract.

PROPOSAL REQUIREMENTS

PREPARATION OF PROPSAL

The Bidders Proposal will be submitted on the proposal form attached herein. The blank spaces in the proposal will be correctly filled out for each and every item listed as to labor, material, and total. The Bidder will sign the proposal correctly, with appropriate names and addresses, as provided for. Any proposal that is altered, has additions not called for, or contains irregularities of any kind, will be rejected.

GUARANTY

No proposal will be considered unless accompanied by a certified check, cashier's check, bid bond, or Letter of Credit equal to ten percent (10%) of the amount of the bid, or a combined Bid Guarantee and Contract Bond for the full amount of the bid.

DELIVERY OF PROPOSAL

Each bid will be sealed in an envelope and marked with the identity of the project, and the name and address of the bidder. The proposal will be delivered to the office of the Board and the same will be received until the hour and date set for the opening thereof, as prescribed in the Legal Advertisement. Any proposal received later than this time will not be opened and will be rejected.

DISQUALIFICATION OF BIDDERS

The Bidder shall make a non-collusion affidavit properly executed, which is part of the proposal. Proposals in which the prices are obviously unbalanced by be rejected. A contract will be awarded only to the lowest and most responsible Bidder capable of performing the work contemplated. The Board reserves the right to reject any and all bids.

QUALIFICATIONS OF BIDDER

Contractors filing a bid will enclose, with the proposal form, a statement of equipment they have available to complete the proposed work, and shall enclose a list of similar projects successfully undertaken.

AWARD OF CONTRACT

The award of the contract, if any, will be to the lowest responsible Bidder whose proposal complies with all requirements. Prior to awarding the contract, the Board shall completely investigate all proposals, and may request a Confidential Financial Statement, and Experience Statement of the Contractor, if they so desire.

REQUIREMENTS OF CONTRACT BOND

The successful Bidder must within ten (10) days after receiving notice of the award, and before entering into a contract, furnish a Contract Bond in an amount not less than 100% of the total bid price on the proposal. The Contractor will then execute the contract with

said sureties, include and return the same to the Board. No proposal shall be considered binding upon the County until the described execution of the contract.

INSURANCE

COVERAGE REQUIREMENTS

The Contractor will produce this a Certificate of Insurance in the following amounts:

- **Workers Compensation.** The Contractor shall maintain workers compensation coverage meeting the requirements of Applicable Law.
- **Commercial General Liability.** The Contractor shall maintain commercial general liability ("CGL") coverage that provides (1) an each-occurrence limit of not less than \$1,000,000, (2) a general-aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000, and (3) a products and completed-operations aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000.
- **Business Automobile Liability.** The Contractor shall maintain business automobile ("BA") coverage written on ISO form CA 00 01 10 01 or a substitute form, providing at least equivalent coverage with a limit of not less than \$1,000,000 each accident.
- **Umbrella/Excess Liability.** The Contractor shall maintain umbrella/excess liability coverage with a limit of not less than \$5,000,000 (in addition to the above-required limits).
- **Professional Liability—Contractor.** The Contractor shall maintain professional liability insurance (including without limitation for sprinkler and/or fire protection and other design-build work included in the Work) without design-build exclusions (1) an each-occurrence limit of not less than \$1,000,000, (2) a annual-aggregate limit of not less than \$2,000,000.

The Contractor shall include the Board, Owner's Representative, and the Architect as additional insureds.

BUILDER'S RISK INSURANCE

1. The Contractor shall provide and maintain, during the progress of the Work and until Contract Completion, a builder's risk insurance policy to cover all Work in the course of construction including false-work, temporary buildings and structures, and materials used in the construction process, stored on or off-site, or while in transit. This insurance shall be on a special cause of loss form that provides coverage on an open perils basis insuring against the direct physical loss of, or damage to, covered property including, but not limited to, theft, vandalism, malicious mischief, earthquake, tornado, lightning, explosion, breakage of glass, flood, collapse, water damage, and hot and cold testing. This insurance shall be written on a replacement cost basis and shall also include debris removal, and/or demolition occasioned by enforcement of Applicable Law.
 - 1.1. The amount of coverage shall be not less than the total completed value of the Project, including the value of permanent fixtures and decorations, with a deductible of not more than \$25,000 per occurrence. Any deductible over the amount specified shall be authorized in writing by the Board.
 - 1.2. The named insureds under the policy shall include the Board, Contractor, Subcontractors at all tiers, and Separate Contractors.

- 1.3. Coverage shall include a provision to pay the reasonable extra costs of acceleration and expediting temporary and permanent repairs to, or permanent replacement of, damaged property. This shall include overtime wages and the extra cost of "express" or other means for rapidly transporting materials and supplies necessary to the repair or replacement.
- 1.4. Coverage shall include "soft cost endorsement" including, but not limited to, the reasonable extra costs of the Owner's Representative and Architect and reasonable Contractor extension or acceleration costs.
 - 1.4.1. Coverage shall include material in transit or stored off-site and identified for the Project.
- 1.5. Coverage shall waive all rights between the Board, Contractor, and Subcontractors at any tier, for damages caused by fire or any other perils to the extent of actual recovery of any insurance proceeds under the policy.
- 1.6. Coverage shall include appropriate sub-limits for installation coverage.
- 1.7. Coverage shall include provisions for mechanical or electrical breakdown, or boiler system testing.
- 1.8. Coverage shall include temporary structures and scaffolding, along with collapse coverage.
- 1.9. Coverage shall be primary to all other applicable insurance.
- 1.10. The builder's risk policy shall specifically permit and allow for Partial Occupancy by the Board prior to Contract Completion and coverage shall remain in effect until all punch list items are completed.
- 1.11. The Contractor's tools and equipment shall not be covered under the builder's risk policy. It is the Contractor's sole responsibility to maintain such coverage, which shall be included in its Overhead (a component of Contractor's Fee) and not included as a separate item in the Contractor's Schedule of Values.
2. If the Contractor is involved solely in the installation of material and equipment and not in new building construction, the Contractor shall purchase and maintain a builder's risk, builder's risk-renovations, or installation floater insurance policy.

WAIVERS OF SUBROGATION

To the fullest extent permitted by Applicable Law, the Contractor waives all rights against the Board, and their agents and employees for damages to the extent covered by any insurance, except rights to the proceeds of that insurance. All policies shall accomplish the waiver of subrogation by endorsement or otherwise.

The Board and Contractor waive all rights against each other for damages caused by fire or other perils to the extent of actual recovery of any insurance proceeds under any property insurance, inland marine insurance, or builder's risk insurance applicable to the Work.

INDEMNIFICATION FOR INJURY OR DAMAGE

1. To the fullest extent permitted by Applicable Law, the Contractor shall indemnify, defend, and hold harmless the Indemnified Parties from and against all claims, costs, damages, losses, fines, penalties, and expenses (including but not limited to all fees and charges of attorneys and other professionals, and all court, arbitration, or other dispute-resolution

costs) arising out of or in connection with the Project, provided that any such claim, cost, damage, loss, fine, penalty, or expense is attributable to:

- 1.1. bodily injury, sickness, disease, or death, or to injury to or destruction of tangible property but only to the extent caused by the negligent acts, errors, or omissions of the Contractor or a person or entity for whom the Contractor may be liable;
 - 1.2. infringement of patent rights or copyrights by the Contractor or a person or entity for whom the Contractor may be liable; or
 - 1.3. a violation of Applicable Law but only to the extent attributable to the Contractor or a person or entity for whom the Contractor may be liable.
2. The Contractor's indemnification obligation under this Section exists regardless of whether or not and the extent to which the claim, damage, loss, fine, penalty, or expense is caused in part by a party indemnified under this Section. But nothing in this Section obligates the Contractor to indemnify any individual or entity from and against the consequences of that individual or entity's own negligence.
 3. The Contractor's obligations under this Section shall not extend to the liability of the Architect, Architect's consultants, agents, representatives, or employees for negligent preparation or approval of Drawings, Specifications, Change Orders, opinions, and any other responsibility of the Architect, except to the extent covered by the Contractor's insurance.
 4. In claims against an Indemnified Party by any direct or indirect employee (or the survivor or personal representative of that employee) of the Contractor or a person or entity for whom the Contractor may be liable, the indemnification obligation under this Section will not be limited by a limitation on the amount or type of damages, compensation, or benefits payable under workers' compensation acts, disability benefit acts, or other employee benefit acts.
 5. The Contractor's indemnification obligation under this Section will not be limited by any insurance policy provided or required in connection with the Project.
 6. The Contractor's obligations under this Section shall not negate, abridge, or reduce other rights or obligations of indemnity, which would otherwise exist as to an Indemnified Party.
 7. The Contractor's indemnification obligation under this Section will survive termination of the Contract and Contract Completion.
 8. The Board may deduct from the Contract Sum the claims, damages, losses, fines, penalties, and expenses for which the Contractor is liable under this Section. If those claims, damages, losses, fines, penalties, and expenses exceed the unpaid balance of the Contract Sum, the Contractor shall immediately pay the difference to the Board.

CONTROL OF THE WORK

AUTHORITY OF THE OWNER'S REPRESENTATIVE

The Owner's Representative shall decide any and all questions, which may arise as to the quality or acceptability of materials furnished, work performed, manner of performance,

rate of progress, and any other items regarding the project. Owner's Representative decisions will be final, and the Owner's Representative shall have authority to enforce these decisions.

AUTHORITY AND DUTIES OF THE ARCHITECT

The Architect is assigned and authorized to administer the Contract. He will give instructions to the contractor on all materials concerning the work and direct the quality of work and material.

CONSTRUCTION STAKES

The contractor will provide all line and grade stakes necessary to the proper execution of the work, unless otherwise provided as a contract bid item.

LEGAL RESPONSIBILITY

LAWS TO BE OBSERVED

The Contractor warrants that he is familiar with, and at all times complies with, provisions of all Federal and State laws, and local ordinances, in any manner affecting the conduct of the work. He shall indemnify and save harmless the Board and its representatives against any claims arising from the violation of any such laws.

SAFETY DEVICES

The Contractor shall provide and maintain safety devices and safeguards, or any other action necessary, to protect the public and property in connection with the work. The Board, and its representatives, shall be saved harmless against any claims arising from any damage or injury to the public or property caused by neglect by the contractor in this regard.

PROSECUTION AND PROGRESS

PERMITS

The Architect shall secure the required structural, plumbing, HVAC, and electrical plan approvals. It is anticipated that these plan approvals will be available forty five (45) days after Notice to Proceed.

The Contractor shall schedule and attend all intermediate and final inspections required for any permit applicable to the Work. The Contractor shall schedule the State Fire Marshal or local fire authority for the life safety inspection for occupancy permits. The Contractor shall give the Architect, Owner's Representative, and Board reasonable notice of the dates and times arranged for inspections. The Contractor shall pay for any reinspections required as a result of the Contractor's failure to receive approval of its Work.

SUBLETTING OF CONTRACT

The Contractor shall not sublet, sell, transfer, assign, or otherwise dispose of the contract or any portion thereof, or of his right, title, or interest therein, without the written consent of the Board. In case such consent is given, this will not release the contractor of his liability under the Contract and Bonds.

LIMITATIONS OF OPERATIONS

The Contractor shall conduct the work at all times in such a manner, and in such a sequence, as will assure the least interface with traffic.

CHARACTER OF WORKMEN, METHODS, AND EQUIPMENT

The contractor shall, at all times, employ sufficient labor and equipment for prosecuting the work to full completion in the manner required by these specifications. All workman shall have sufficient skill and experience to perform properly the work assigned to them. Any person employed by the Contractor, or by any subcontractor, who is, in the opinion of the inspector, unable to do his work in a proper and skillful manner, or is intemperate or disorderly, shall, at the written request of the inspector, be removed forthwith by the contractor or subcontractor. Should the contractor or subcontractor fail to remove such person, or fail to furnish suitable and sufficient personnel for the proper prosecution of the work, the Owner's Representative may withhold all estimates which become due, or they may suspend the work by written notice until the Contractor complies with such orders.

PAYROLLS AND MATERIALS PAYMENTS

Upon completion and final inspection of the work, prior to the final payment, the Contractor will submit an affidavit stating that all wages and materials have been paid in full.

ACCEPTANCE, MEASUREMENT, AND PAYMENT

EXTRA WORK

Extra work performed in accordance with a supplementary agreement (Change Order) will be paid for at the unit or Lump Sum prices stipulated in said agreement.

PARTIAL PAYMENTS

The Contractor shall receive partial payments for work performed on a monthly basis and shall be at a rate of 92% of the estimate, with 8% retainage. Upon completion of 50% of the contract, payments will be increased to 100% of work completed thereafter, less such amounts as the Board shall determine for incomplete work and unsettled claims. The contractor must submit a separate Application for Payment when 50% completion is achieved. The Board will not accept a billing for 51% complete, or any other split billing.

ESCROW

The Board will hold the retainer of 8% in escrow at a local bank. A separate retainage invoice must be submitted for approval and payment, detailing the retained amounts of all previous invoices.

The retainage will be deposited in an escrow account at a local bank, accruing interest in the name of the contractor. The account shall require two (2) signatures to withdraw funds (Contractor and Board).

Upon completion of the contract, the Board, in writing the release of the account to the contractor. The Board will release its "signature hold" on the escrow account only on the approval of the MHARS Board of Lorain County. The Contractor will be required to sign a receipt of funds. Prior to the release of the retainer, the Contractor shall furnish a 10%

maintenance bond for a period of twelve (12) months to insure that the improvements are in satisfactory condition. The amount shall be ten percent (10%) of the total contract amount.

LIQUIDATED DAMAGES

1. If the Contractor fails to achieve a Milestone within the associated Contract Time, it would be difficult, if not impossible, to determine the Board's resulting damages. Therefore, if the Contractor fails to achieve a Milestone within the associated Contract Time, the Contractor shall (at the Board's option) pay to or credit the Board the Liquidated Damages per day sum of \$2,500.00 for each day that the Contractor fails to achieve a Milestone within the associated Contract Time.
2. If the Contractor simultaneously fails to achieve two or more Milestones, the Board shall be entitled to recover the sum of the associated Liquidated Damages per day rates.
3. The Liquidated Damages described in this Section are only intended to compensate the Board for the direct damages it incurs as a result of the Contractor's failure to achieve the Milestones within their associated Contract Times.
4. The Liquidated Damages described in this Section are not intended to compensate the Board for any damages the Board incurs on account of (1) any claims attributable to the Contractor that are brought by others including Separate Consultants and Separate Contractors or (2) any failure of the Contractor to timely, properly, and completely perform the Contract other than the failure to achieve the Milestones within their associated Contract Times.
5. The parties acknowledge that the above-listed Liquidated Damages per day sums are not penalties, and they each irrevocably waive the right (if any) to challenge the validity and enforceability of those Liquidated Damages per day sums. Notwithstanding any other provision of the Contract Documents to the contrary, if a court determines that the Liquidated Damages per day sums or their application are void and unenforceable, the Board shall be entitled to recover the actual damages that it incurs on account of the Contractor's failure to achieve one or more of the Milestones within the Contract Times.
6. In addition to other rights that the Board may have relative to the Liquidated Damages, the Contracting Authority may deduct the Liquidated Damages from the Contract Sum as the damages accrue. If payments then or thereafter due the Contractor are not sufficient to cover such amounts, the Contractor shall immediately pay the amount of the insufficiency to the Board.

FINAL INSPECTION

The Contractor shall make all repairs to defective workmanship or materials for the term of one year after the date of final completion. Contractor shall correct and repair promptly during the time period of one year, all defective work and materials of whatever nature and description. Ordinary wear and tear damage due to negligent or improper operation on the part of the County shall not be considered an obligation of the Contractor. Twelve months after the date of the final completion, the Board shall make a final inspection of the work. If final

inspection shows the work to be complete in accordance with the contract, plans and specifications, such acceptance shall be prerequisite to the release of the maintenance bond.

Should the final inspection show defects due to the non-fulfillment of this contract, the Board shall so notify the Contractor in writing and thereupon the Contractor shall repair or replace all defects of materials, equipment or workmanship at his own cost and expense.

If the Contractor shall fail to make such repairs after written notification, the Board shall cause such repairs to be made at the expense of the Contractor.

DISPUTE RESOLUTION POLICY

This specification is based on the partnering approach to project administration. The Contractor must follow this process in order to resolve disputes on the project and to seek additional compensation or contract time from the Board in the form of an administrative claim.

All parties in the dispute must following the specified steps.

Disputes will include disagreements, matters in question, and differences of opinion between Board personnel and the Contractor. Claims are disputes that are not settled in the dispute resolution process and the Contractor has documented costs or time incurred as a result of such disputes.

Disputes and claims by subcontractors and suppliers may be pursued by the Contractor on behalf of subcontractors or suppliers. Disputes and claims of subcontractors and suppliers against the Contractor will not be reviewed by the Board. Disputes and claims by subcontractor and suppliers against the Board but not supported by the Contractor will not be reviewed by the Board.

Disputes and claims subject to review by the Board include:

1. Interpretation of specifications, standard drawings, plans, the proposal, working drawings, change orders, and orders by Board, Owner's Representative or Architect personnel having authority over the project.
2. Differing site conditions.
3. Cost and time incurred by:
 - a. Suspension of the work
 - b. Significant changes in scope of work
 - c. Utility interference with the work
 - d. Extra work ordered
 - e. Acts or inaction of the Board or its representative
4. Adequacy and constructability of the plan design.

5. Contract time extensions due to weather, shortages of labor, equipment, or materials, or other causes beyond the Contractor's control.
6. Other subjects mutually agreed upon the Board and Contractor to be under the scope of the dispute resolution and claims process.

Early Notice. The Contractor, or subcontractor through the Contractor, shall give to the Owner's Representative and Architect, written notice of any circumstances or dispute on the project that may result in a claim. This early notice must be given by the end of the second working day following the occurrence of the circumstances or dispute. The Owner's Representative and Contractor or subcontractor shall maintain records of labor, equipment, and materials used on the disputed work or made necessary by the circumstance. Such records shall start when early notice is received by the Owner's Representative or when the project personnel are aware of the circumstance or dispute.

Continuation of Work. The Contractor or subcontractor shall continue with all project work, including that which is in dispute. The Board will continue payments for contract work.

STEP 1 of Dispute Resolution (Project Level). The Owner's Representative and Architect will meet with the Contractor's superintendent within two (2) working days of receipt of any early notice. They shall review all pertinent information and contract provisions and negotiate an equitable settlement according to the Contract documents. If settlement is not achieved, they must escalate the dispute to Step 2.

STEP 2 of Dispute Resolution (Administrative Level). If the dispute is escalated to Step 2, the Board's Director or designee (other than the project personnel involved) shall meet with personnel from the Contractor's headquarters, and consider the dispute. This Step 2 meeting shall occur within twenty (20) working days of the completion of Step 1. The Board and Contractor's personnel shall review the information on the dispute presented by the personnel involved in Step 1 and negotiate an equitable settlement according to the Contract Documents.

Dispute Documentation. The Contractor shall submit documentation of the dispute to the Board ten (10) days before the Administrative Level Review. Failure to meet this time frame or to request an extension necessary for the proper preparation of the documentation may terminate further review of the dispute.

The dispute document shall be an original document that clearly and in detail gives the following information for each item of additional compensation and time extension requested:

- a.) A narrative of the disputed work or project circumstances at issue with sufficient description and information to enable understanding by a third person who is not familiar with the project. This section must include the dates of the disputed work and the date of early notice.
- b.) References to the applicable provisions of the plans, specifications, proposal or other contract documents. Copies of the cited provisions shall be included in the claim document.

- c.) The dollar amount of additional compensation and length of contract time extension being requested.
- d.) The cost and schedule analysis and supporting documents that were the basis for the requested compensation and time extensions stated in c).
- e.) Copies of relevant correspondence and other pertinent documents.

The dispute document shall be identified by project number, Contract name, subcontractor, or supplier, if involved in the dispute, and dispute number.

SUSPENSION AND TERMINATION

1. Suspension of the Work

- 1.1. The Board, without cause and without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have, may order the Contractor in writing to suspend, delay, or interrupt performance of the Work in whole or in part for such period as the Board may determine.
 - 1.1.1. If the Board suspends the Work under this Section and the Contractor the Contract Sum and Contract Times shall be adjusted for increases in the cost and time caused by the suspension, delay, or interruption. The adjustment of the Contract Sum, however, shall not include profit (a component of Contractor's Fee).
 - 1.1.2. Notwithstanding the foregoing, no adjustment shall be made to the Contract Sum or Contract Times to the extent that:
 - 1.1.2.1. performance was, or could have been, suspended, delayed, or interrupted by a cause for which the Contractor is responsible; or
 - 1.1.2.2. an equitable adjustment is made or denied under another provision of the Contract.
 - 1.1.3. If the Board suspends the Work under this Section 1.1 and the Contractor submits a proper Contractor Payment Request, subject to all other provisions of the Contract Documents, the Contractor shall be entitled to payment of compensation due under the Contract Documents for Work performed before the suspension based upon the Schedule of Values.
- 1.2. The Board, without prejudice to any other right or remedy it may have, may order the Contractor in writing to suspend, delay, or interrupt the performance of the Work in whole or in part for such period as the Board may determine for any of the following reasons: (1) Defective Work; (2) the Contractor is causing undue risk of damage to any part of the Project or adjacent area; (3) the Contractor fails to furnish or perform the Work in such a way that the complete Work will conform to the requirements of the Contract Documents; or (4) any other cause the Board reasonably believes justifies suspension.
 - 1.2.1. The Board's exercise of its right to suspend the Work under this Section 1.2 shall not entitle the Contractor to any adjustment of the Contract Sum, Contract Times, or both.
 - 1.2.2. If the Board is adjudged to have improperly suspended the Work under this Section 1.2, the suspension shall be deemed to have been a suspension under Section 1.1.

- 1.3. Upon receipt of notice of suspension under this Section 1, the Contractor shall cease Work on the suspended activities and take all necessary or appropriate steps to limit disbursements and minimize respective costs. The Contractor shall furnish a report to the Board, within 5 days of receiving the notice of suspension, describing the status of the Work, including, but not limited to, results accomplished, resulting conclusions, and other information as the Board may require.
 - 1.4. The Board's right to stop the Work shall not give rise to any duty to exercise the right for the benefit of the Contractor or any other party, and the Board's exercise or failure to exercise the right shall not prejudice any of the Board's other rights.
2. Termination for Convenience
 - 2.1. The Board may, at any time, terminate the Contract in whole or in part for the Owner's convenience and without cause, at any time upon 10 days' written notice to the Contractor.
 - 2.2. Upon receipt of the notice of termination for convenience, the Contractor shall immediately proceed with performance of the following duties in accordance with instructions from the Board:
 - 2.2.1. cease operation as specified in the notice;
 - 2.2.2. place no further orders and enter into no further subcontracts for materials, labor, services, or facilities, except as necessary to complete continued portions of the Project;
 - 2.2.3. terminate all subcontracts and orders to the extent they relate to the Work terminated;
 - 2.2.4. proceed with Work not terminated; and
 - 2.2.5. take actions that may be necessary, or that the Board may direct, for the protection and preservation of the terminated Work.
 - 2.3. Upon termination, the Board shall pay the Contractor in accordance with the Schedule of Values for Work completed, including any retained funds, and the value of materials ordered and delivered, less any salvage credit the Contractor may receive for them.
 - 2.3.1. All materials, equipment, facilities, and supplies at the Site or stored off-site, for which the Contractor has received payment, shall become the property of the Board.
 - 2.3.2. The Contractor is entitled to a fair and reasonable profit for Work performed and reasonable expenses directly attributable to termination of the Contract. In no event shall the Contractor be entitled to (1) Contractor's Fee on Work not performed or (2) compensation in excess of the total Contract Sum.
 - 2.4. If the Board terminates the Work under this Section 2, the termination shall not affect the rights or remedies of the Board against the Contractor then existing or which may thereafter accrue.
 - 2.5. Notwithstanding Section 2.3, if the Board terminates the Work under this Section 2, but there exists an event of the Contractor's default, the Contractor shall be entitled to receive only such amounts as it would be entitled to receive following the occurrence of an event of default as provided in Section 3.
 3. Termination for Cause
 - 3.1. The Board may terminate all or a portion of the Contract if the Contractor commits a material breach of the Contract including but not limited to:
 - 3.1.1. failure to prosecute the Work with the necessary force or in a timely manner;

- 3.1.2. refusal to remedy Defective Work;
 - 3.1.3. failure to supply enough properly skilled workers or proper materials;
 - 3.1.4. failure to properly make payment to Subcontractors or Consultants;
 - 3.1.5. performance of any services outside of the United States;
 - 3.1.6. permitting its Subcontractors or Consultants to perform any services outside of the United States; or
 - 3.1.7. disregarding laws, ordinances, or rules, regulations, or orders of a public authority with jurisdiction over the Project.
- 3.2. If the Board intends to exercise its termination rights under this Section 3, the Board shall issue not less than 5 days' written notice to the Contractor and the Contractor's Surety in accordance with ORC Section 153.17 ("5-Day Notice").
 - 3.3. If the Contractor fails to satisfy the requirements set forth in the 5-Day Notice within 15 days of receipt of the 5Day Notice, the Board may declare the Contractor in default, terminate the Contract, and employ upon the Work the additional force or supply materials or either as appropriate, and remove Defective Work.
 - 3.4. If the Contract is terminated, the Contractor's Surety may perform the Contract. If the Contractor's Surety does not commence performance of the Contract within 10 days of the date of Contract termination, the Board may complete the Work by means the Board determines appropriate. The Board may take possession of and use all materials, facilities, and equipment at the Site or stored off-site, for which the State has paid.
 - 3.5. If the Contract is terminated, the Contractor shall not be entitled to further payment. If the unpaid balance of the Contract Sum is exceeded by the costs of finishing the Work, including without limitation the fees and charges of engineers, architects, attorneys, and other professionals and court costs, and other damages incurred by the Board and not expressly waived, the Contractor or Surety shall immediately pay the amount of the insufficiency to the Board. This obligation for payment shall survive termination of the Contract.
 - 3.6. If the Contractor's Surety performs the Work, the provisions of the Contract Documents govern the Surety's performance, with the Surety in place of the Contractor in all provisions including, but not limited to, provisions for payment for the Work, and provisions of the right of the Board to complete the Work.
 - 3.7. If the Board terminates the Contract under this Section 3, the termination shall not affect any rights or remedies of the Board against the Contractor then existing or which may thereafter accrue. The Board's retention or payment of funds due the Contractor shall not release the Contractor or the Contractor's Surety from liability for performance of the Work in accordance with the requirements of the Contract Documents.
 - 3.8. If the Board is adjudged to have improperly terminated the Contract under this Section 3, the termination will be deemed to have been a termination under Section 2.

FINAL PAYMENT

The Board agrees that if all the work is in good order and approved by the Board following inspection, the Contractor shall be entitled to the whole sum of the final payment. All previous partial estimates and payments shall be subject to correction in the final estimate and payment.

The Contractor and each of its Subcontractors, regardless of tier, shall execute a Payment Release Affidavit to certify that the Contractor and each of its Subcontractors,

regardless of tier, have complied with all requirements of ORC Chapter 4115, and to certify that all of its Subcontractors have been paid in full for all Work performed or materials furnished for the Project.

The acceptance of the final payment by the Contractor shall operate as and be considered a release of the Board from all claims and liability to the Contractor for any reason whatsoever.

SPECIFIC PROVISIONS

LOCAL LABOR TO BE EMPLOYED:

The Contractor, in the construction of the work, shall give preference in employment to citizens of the County of Lorain, and where citizens of the County are not available, shall give preference to citizens of the State of Ohio.

LABOR – CONDITIONS AND EMPLOYMENT:

The provisions of this contract as to hours, wages and employment shall apply with equal force to all workmen engaged in the performance of this contract, whether employed by the original contractor or by a subcontractor. Preference shall be given to qualified local residents in the employment of laborers and mechanics for work on the project under this contract. No person under the age of sixteen (16) years shall be employed on the project under this contract. No person whose age or physical condition is such as to make his employment dangerous to his health or safety, or to the health or safety of others, shall be employed on the project under this contract – provided that this shall not operate against the employment of physically handicapped persons, otherwise employable, where such persons may be safely assigned to work which they can ably perform. No person currently serving sentence in a penal or correctional institution, and no inmate of an institution for mental diseases, shall be employed on the project under this contract.

There shall be no discrimination by reason of race, creed, color, national origin or political affiliations, in the employment of persons for work under this contract, if such persons are qualified by training and experience for the work.

The legal rights of all workers on the project under this contract to organize and to bargain collectively, to be protected from the requirements to join a company union, and to enjoy freedom of expression and action with respect to wages, hours and conditions or labor, shall not be infringed.

In case the Owner so elects, the Contractor shall require that workers on the project under this contract must register at such times and places and in such manner as the Owner shall direct.

Below are the responses to the items that need to be addressed:

Experience- Projects don't demonstrate 30% self-performance:

The projects that we provided, were recently completed projects that met the criteria of the size, complexity, with higher contract amounts. The two main factors of why these projects did not meet the 30% self-performance requirements are:

1. Each project the owner required that all scopes of work require a minimum of 3 (three) responsive bidders for each scope of work. Panzica Construction bid out all the scopes of work as required but was not the successful lowest bidder for all the scopes of work we would self-perform. Our bid tab response sheet for the Lorain County Crisis indicates we were not the lowest bidder for the CFMF, Metal Studs, Drywall and Interior Ceiling on this project.
2. Each of the listed projects had scopes of work or building elements that increased the cost of the projects which need to be performed by certified installers for those scopes of work.
 - a. Brooklyn City Center had jail detention equipment, security ceilings, detention security system and controls.
 - b. The Cleveland Museum of Natural History the project had delegated design of a very expressive and intricate building envelope, which included GFRC and FRP panels. It also included custom acoustical plaster.
 - c. The Cleveland Foundation utilized an integrated mass timber and structural steel frame.

Two projects we are currently working on are, The Streetsboro Community Center and The Cuyahoga County Public Library Brooklyn Branch, Panzica Construction was low bidder for multiply scopes of work and will be self-performing 34.1% to 27.8% of each project.

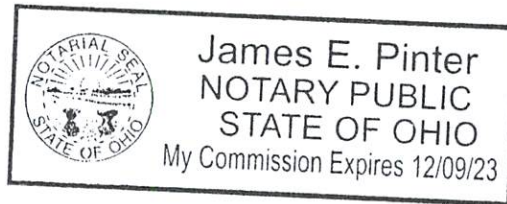

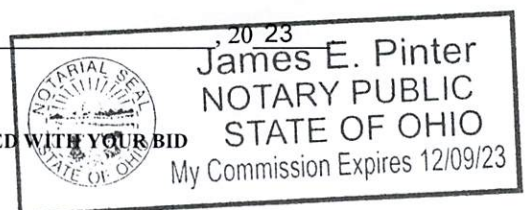

Example. Article 20 of the U.S.-China income tax treaty allows an exemption from tax for scholarship income received by a Chinese student temporarily present in the United States. Under U.S. law, this student will become a resident alien for tax purposes if his or her stay in the United States exceeds 5 calendar years. However, paragraph 2 of the first Protocol to the U.S.-China treaty (dated April 30, 1984) allows the provisions of Article 20 to continue to apply even after the Chinese student becomes a resident alien of the United States. A Chinese student who qualifies for this exception (under paragraph 2 of the first protocol) and is relying on this exception to claim an exemption from tax on his or her scholarship or fellowship income would attach to Form W-9 a statement that includes the information described above to support that exemption.

Backup Withholding

What is backup withholding? Persons making certain payments to you must under certain conditions withhold and pay to the IRS 24% of such payments. This is called "backup withholding." Payments that may be subject to backup withholding include interest, tax-exempt interest, dividends, broker and barter exchange transactions, rents, royalties, nonemployee pay, payments made in settlement of payment card and third party network transactions, and certain payments from fishing boat operators. Real estate transactions are not subject to backup withholding.

Site Specific Safety Program

At Panzica Construction, our people are our most important asset and their safety is our greatest responsibility. It is Panzica Construction policy that every employee is entitled to a safe and healthy place to work. When a person enters a jobsite, he or she has a right to expect that they will be provided with a safe place in which to work, safe machines and tools with which to do the job and that they will be able to devote their energies to their work.

There is a basic responsibility for the Panzica team, as well as all Contractors, Subcontractors and Consultants to make the safety and health of all workers onsite a part of our daily concern. All employees on this jobsite are expected to use the safety equipment provided to them by their respective employers. Rules of conduct, as well as, rules of safety and health shall be observed and obeyed at all times by any person entering the jobsite. Safety equipment must not be destroyed, misused or abused.

EMERGENCY PROCEDURES

1. In order to not interfere with employees hearing an emergency signal. Radios are not allowed to be used on site weather standard radios, or cell phones or electronic devices with ear buds.
2. Panzica Construction will provide fire extinguishers located at intervals that meet all federal, state and local codes. Employees will need to learn where firefighting equipment is located and learn how to use it. At a minimum each employee should be trained in the P.A.S.S. method of using a Fire Extinguisher.
3. Fire extinguishers: If any fire extinguisher is discharged, Panzica Construction is to be notified and an incident report filled out.
4. In case of Fire:
 - Immediately call 911 and notify Panzica Construction
 - Follow building evacuation plan which will be established by Panzica Construction.
 - **NOTE: the evacuation plan can and will change as needed based on the scope of work at the time.**
 - Any employees on site when the plan changes will be made aware of the changes.





GENERAL SAFETY RULES

ALL SAFETY RULES MUST BE OBEYED. FAILURE TO DO SO WILL RESULT IN DISCIPLINARY ACTION BEING TAKEN,

JOBSITE ATTIRE:

- **All persons visiting, or working on site are required to wear; hard hats, safety glasses, and some form of high visibility clothing (vests, shirts, or jacket).**
- Shirts and long legged pants must be worn to protect against burns, weld splatter, and cuts. Minimum clothing for the upper body is a "T" shirt, with a minimum sleeve length of 4" from the shoulder, cut off sleeves (or tank tops) will not be allowed on the jobsite. Footwear must be a work type, boots or shoe, no tennis, dress or open shoes on site.

JOBSITE CONDUCT:

- No horseplay will be tolerated on the jobsite. Injury or removal from the job, or both, can be the result.
- Smoking is not permitted within the building, offices, and office trailers or within 50 feet of a building entrance.
- Chewing tobacco and/or sunflower seeds will not be allowed within the building, offices, or office trailers
- The use of illegal drugs or alcohol or being under the influence of same on the project shall be cause for removal from the job. Employees who use strong prescription drugs that warns against driving or using machinery should notify their respective supervisor prior to beginning the workday.
- Anyone found loitering, pandering or engaging in lewd activities, fighting or other rowdy behavior, using profane language or gestures or otherwise disrupting the smooth and efficient flow of work and or activities on the site, will be removed from the job site and prohibited from future work on this project.
- Sanitation facilities have been or will be provided for your use. Defacing or damaging these facilities is forbidden.
- Never throw anything "off the building" material and debris are to be moved by lifts, or chutes.

SAFETY PRACTICES:

- Panzica Construction is not directly responsible for providing safety, and safety equipment for the Contractors, or their workers; however Panzica Construction and any other representative of the Owner shall have the right, but not the responsibility, to stop any action which is considered unsafe.
- Failure to comply with any elements of this section shall be cause to withhold progress payments.
- Each Contractor shall have a comprehensive hazard communication program, and shall provide and maintain two (2) complete Hazcom manuals at the jobsite, including SDS sheets for all products used or supplied for the work. One of the manuals shall be located in the Panzica Construction office, and the other shall be located in the Contractor's field office. These manuals shall both be maintained and updated when new SDS sheets are required. No requisition shall be processed until the Contractor's SDS books are on file.



- All workers should notify their supervisor of unlabeled or suspect toxic substances immediately and avoid contact. All workers should know where the material safety data sheets are located on the site.
- Each Contractor shall submit a comprehensive safety manual plan to Panzica Construction and shall be required to comply with all requirements of said plan. No requisitions shall be processed until the safety manual is on site.
- Each Contractor is responsible for the safety of all personnel on the jobsite. Each Contractor shall perform any work necessary to maintain a safe jobsite for all workers and visitors. In addition to this general responsibility of all Contractors, certain specific tasks have been assigned to contractors in accordance with the specific scope of work. Each contractor shall comply with all applicable laws as they apply to maintaining a safe construction job site.
- Each Contractor when they need to alter the normal flow of employees exiting the building (such as closing stairways) shall assist with the development of a plan detailing how exiting required by the applicable building code shall be maintained during construction. The plan shall indicate temporary construction required to isolate construction equipment, materials, people, dust, fumes, odors and noise during the construction period
- Each Contractor shall be responsible for daily inspections to assure that construction materials, equipment or debris do not block fire exits or emergency egress points.
- Each Contractor shall hold "Tool Box" safety meetings with employees on a weekly basis, or more often as necessary, and shall submit evidence of all safety meetings to Panzica Construction.
- Each Contractor shall submit accident and injury reports to Panzica Construction no later than 24 hours after the incident. In the event of an injury the contractor is required to fill out an accident form as soon as physically possible with as much information as possible. This form can be updated at a later time after medical treatment if required.
- Each Contractor is responsible for providing fire extinguishers where needed, based on their scope of work, and OSHA & NFPA codes. Panzica Construction will provide fire extinguishers located at intervals that meet all federal, state and local codes, for emergency evacuation purposes.
- Each Contractor is responsible to take all steps to prevent fires. The Contractor safety representative shall conduct an inspection of the work area, before any hot work can begin. Subcontractors shall appoint an employee who shall serve as a fire watch. This employee shall be in the area during hot work and as needed (a minimum of one half hour) after the hot work to watch for any fire. The fire watch shall have all firefighting equipment (water hose, fire extinguishers) in the work area before the hot work starts.
- Each Contractor is responsible to inspect power tools and equipment daily to assure that they are in proper working order. Worker should not use power tools and equipment until they have been properly instructed in safe work methods and become authorized to use them. Be sure that all guards are in place. Do not remove, displace, damage or destroy any safety device or safeguard furnished or provided for use on the job.
- Areas of overhead work will need to be coordinated with Panzica Construction prior to commencement of work. Building entrances that have overhead work being performed will need to be closed off and barricaded by the contractor performing the overhead work. These closures will need to be coordinated with the Panzica Construction in advance so that all contractors on the site can be aware of the closure. Do not enter an area which has been roped off, flagged, or barricaded.
- Each Contractor is responsible to provide a legal means of transportation to and from the jobsite. Riding in the back of an open pickup truck is not allowed. All transportation will be in closed vehicles only.



- Trenches must be properly protected by shored/ sloped or shielding and comply with all the OSHA requirements. Keep out of trenches or cuts that have not been properly protected. Excavated or other material shall not be stored nearer than 2 feet from the edge of any excavation. All excavations must be fenced off whenever work is not being performed in or around the excavation. If you must work around power shovels, cranes, trucks, and dozers, make sure operators can always see you.
- All Contractors are required to clean their own work area consistently throughout the workday. All Contractors shall provide daily debris removal to the dumpsters. Failure to comply with cleaning requirements will activate Panzica Construction / Owner remedies, all cost associated with providing a cleanup crew will be back charged to the offending contractor(s).
- All Contractors shall create a specific safety plan for any "confined space" entry, in conjunction with their task plan for the work done in the space. A competent person must be named for this work.
- All Contractors shall call Ohio Utilities Service OUPS at 1-800-362-2764 before they dig.
- All Contractors shall have only trained-authorized employees operate any equipment. Where OSHA requires certification for PIT-RTFLs those operators shall have all required training and certification and copies will be provided to the Panzica Construction.
- All cranes that will be used on site will have a current annual inspection, and will be barricaded to prevent employees from getting into the "swing radius" of the crane. A lifting plan shall be developed before any crane work commences. The lifting plan shall include daily inspections for all the rigging equipment.
- All workers on the job will be required to attend a safety orientation outlining the expectations on the jobsite,
- Each Contractor using ladders must be aware of basic hazards,, such as the following items:
 - Use the "four to one" rule when using a ladder. One foot of base for every four feet of height.
 - Always secure the bottom of the ladder with cleats and/or safety feet. Lash off the top of ladder to avoid shifting.
 - Ladders must extend a min. of three feet above a landing for proper use.
 - Defective ladders must be properly tagged and removed from service.
 - Keep ladder base free of debris such as, hoses, wires, material, etc.
- Each Contractor requiring the use of scaffolding shall be responsible to provide a scaffold erection plan to the Panzica Construction prior to the erection of and scaffolding system. Included within the plan shall be:
 - Name of the competent person onsite that will be responsible for monitoring the erection process and performing the daily inspection of the scaffold
 - Erection and dismantling plan for the scaffold system
 - Daily inspection process and forms. Scaffold Inspections shall be performed in accordance with the OSHA regulations and noted on the Subcontractors JHA forms which will need to be turned into the Panzica Construction.
- Each Contractor requiring the use of Bakers (type) Scaffolding will be required to utilize handrails at all times when platforms are 4'-0" or more above a walking working surface. Wheels need to be locked

when the scaffolding is in use and rolling the scaffolding when occupied must be in accordance with OSHA Subpart L standards.

- Each Contractor requiring the use of fall protection will be responsible to develop a fall protection plan that will outline how they will provide fall protection for their employees. The plan must also include a rescue plan in the event that an employee does fall. The use of safety harness with safety lines when working from unprotected areas, greater than 6 feet high is mandatory, unless the employees are working under other OSHA Subparts that have trigger heights other than Subpart M. All fall protection must be inspected daily per OSHA Subpart M.
- All Contractors must have a Silica Program that meets the OSHA requirements, including an "Exposure Control Plan"
- Each contractor is required to complete a "Job Hazard Analysis" of all activities performed on the jobsite. These reports will be required to be turned into the Panzica Construction on a regular basis.



The Mental Health Addiction & Recovery Services Board of Lorain County has designated Barry Habony as Wage Coordinator, in accordance with Section 4115.071 of the Ohio Revised Code. His office is located at 1173 North Ridge Road East, Lorain, Ohio 44055. Contractors are required to supply to the Wage Coordinator, a schedule of the dates during the life of his contract with Lorain County on which he is required to pay wages to his employees. He shall also deliver to the Wage Coordinator a certified copy of his payroll within two weeks after the initial pay date and supplemental reports for each month thereafter, which shall exhibit for each employee, his name, current address, social security number, number of hours worked, rate of pay, job classification, fringe payments, and deductions from his wages. If the life of the contract is expected to be no more than four months from the beginning of performance by the contractor or subcontractor, such supplemental reports shall be filed each week after the initial report. The certification of each payroll shall be executed by the contractor, subcontractor, or duly appointed agent thereof and shall state that the payroll is correct and complete and that during the payroll period, all persons employed on said project have been paid the full weekly wages earned, that no rebates have or will be made either directly or indirectly to, or on behalf of said contractor or subcontractor for the full weekly wages earned by any person and that no deductions have been made either directly or indirectly from the full wages earned by any person, other than permissible deductions.

LISTING OF VIOLATORS OF PREVAILING WAGE

If you or any principal contractor or subcontractor appear on a list of violators as filed with the Secretary of State pursuant to Ohio Revised Code Section 4115.133, you are not qualified to bid on this project if within two years of the date of your conviction.

PREVAILING WAGE COORDINATOR MONITORING PROCEDURES AT PROJECT SITE

1. Wage Coordinator shall spot check employees pay checks in the field on the scheduled pay days for full compliance, with regard to the prevailing wage rates, including benefits. See sections 4115.031 and 4115.11.
2. Wage Coordinator shall visit the project site to get names of employees performing work on the project site, to cross check with payroll reports submitted. See section 4115.07.
3. Wage Coordinator shall verify the subcontractors performing work on the project site with regard to whether they have been approved by the contracting authority. See Section 4115.05.
4. Wage Coordinator shall check to see that the prevailing wages are posted on the project site in a place accessible to employees. See section 4115.07.

PREVAILING WAGE MEMORANDUM

A. Contract and subcontract provisions.

1. Redetermination of Rate. If the contract under which the prevailing wage is to be paid is not entered into, or work thereunder commenced within 90 days from the date of determination, then a redetermination must be obtained. See section 4115.05.
2. Contracts. Every contract with the contractor must provide each laborer, workman, or mechanic employed by the contractor or any subcontractor, or other persons about or upon the project must be paid at the Prevailing Wage provided in Chapter 4115. See section 4115.05.
3. Subcontracts. No contractor or subcontractor under a contract for the project shall sublet any work unless specifically authorized to do so by the contract. See section 4115.05.

B. Reporting obligations placed on contractors and subcontractors.

1. General. Contractors and subcontractors should comply with all reporting provisions applicable to them under Chapter 4115, including the following items:
2. Reports to Employees: On the first pay date, furnish each employee not covered by a collective bargaining agreement or an understanding with a bona fide labor organization (a) individual written notification of the job classification assigned to each employee (b) the Prevailing Wage determined applicable to that classification (separated into hourly rate of pay and fringe benefits); and (c) the identity of the Wage Coordinator. Each contractor and subcontractor must also furnish individual written notification to each affected employee every time the job classification of the employee is changed. See section 4115.05.
3. Payment of Wages: Each contractor and subcontractor must make full payment of the Prevailing Wage in legal tender without deductions as described in, or otherwise provided by Section 4115.07. See Section 4115.07.

The obligation to make the required payments may be discharged in the manner described in section 4115.031.

Employers who have not established a plan by a labor agreement or otherwise for the provision of wages as defined in division (E)(2) of Section 4115.03 must pay the Prevailing Wage in full in cash. See section 4115.11.

4. Records to be maintained: Contractors and subcontractors must maintain payroll records with respect to the wages paid to and the number of hours worked by each employee, which must cover all disbursements of wages to employees who are required to be paid not less than the Prevailing Wage. The records must be open to inspection by the Bureau or the Wage Coordinator and are not to be destroyed or removed from Ohio for one year following the completion of the project. See section 4115.07.
5. Posting at project site: Contractors or subcontractors must post in a prominent and accessible place on the project site a legible statement of the schedule of the Prevailing Wages specified in the contract of the various classifications of laborers, workmen, and mechanics employed, which is to remain posted during the life of each contract. See section 4115.07.
6. Report to the Wage Coordinator: As soon as performance is begun under their contract, each contractor or subcontractor must supply or deliver to the Wage Coordinator (a) a schedule of the dates during the life of the contract on which they are required to pay wages to employees and (b) a certified copy of the payroll within two weeks after the initial pay date and supplemental reports for each month thereafter which contain each employee's name, current address, social security number, number of hours worked during each day of the pay period covered and the total for each week, hourly rate of pay, job classification, fringe benefits, and deductions from wages. If the contract life is expected to be no more than four months from the beginning of performance, the supplemental reports shall be filed **each week** after the initial report. See section 4115.071(c).
7. Preparation of payroll certification: Each payroll certification must be executed by the contractor, subcontractor, or their duly appointed agent, recite that the payroll is correct and complete and that the wage rates shown are not less than those required by the contract. See section 4115.071(c).

C. Duties Of The Wage Coordinator

The wage Coordinator's duties are those specified in Section 4115.071 which include, without limitation, establishing and maintaining for public inspection, files of payroll reports and affidavits submitted by contractors and subcontractors pursuant to Section 4115.03 to 4115.16, ascertaining from contractors or subcontractors, at the beginning of performance under the contract, dates during the life of the contract when payments of wages to employees are to be made; receive from each contractor or subcontractor a copy of the complete payroll as required, establish and follow procedures to monitor compliance by each contractor and subcontractor with the requirements imposed by Chapter 4115 for timely filing of copies of payroll records; and reporting any

delinquency in filings of certified payroll to the Director of the Bureau of Employment Services. See section 4115.071.

D. Enforcement And Penalties

1. Halt of Work: If the Bureau's investigation discloses that a contractor or subcontractor has failed to pay the Prevailing Wage, the Director may order a halt on the part of the contract for which less than Prevailing Wage has been paid until such time as the defaulting contractor has filed a bond with the Bureau in the amount set by the Bureau, conditioned upon payment of the Prevailing Wage. The Bureau may not order the work halted unless it (a) provides written notice to the contractor or subcontractor and their sureties and (b) holds a hearing pursuant to Section 4115.13. See section 4115.15.
2. Employee Suit for Recovery: Any employee upon a project paid less than the applicable Prevailing Wage may recover from the person, firm, or corporation that constructs the project twice the difference between the applicable Prevailing wage and the amount paid to him. The employee may file suit for recovery within sixty days of the Director of the Bureau of Employment Service's determination of any violations of Chapter 4115.03 to 4115.16. If the employee wins, the employer must pay the costs and reasonable attorney's fees allowed by the court. See section 4115.10(A). Section 4115.032 also provides that "...the Bureau of Employment Services shall, and any interested person may, bring proceedings under such section, to enforce compliance." The term "interested party" is defined in Section 4115.03(F) as follows: "(F) 'Interested party', with respect to a particular improvement, means: (1) Any person who submits a bid for the purpose of securing the award of a contract for construction of the public improvement; (2) Any person acting as a subcontractor of a person mentioned in division (f)(1) of this section; (3) any bona fide organization of labor which has as members or is authorized to represent employees of a person mentioned in division (F)(1) or (2) of this section and which exists, in whole or in part, for the purpose of negotiating with employers concerning wages, hours, or terms, and conditions of employment of employees; (4) any Association having any members of the persons mentioned in division (F)(1) or (2) of this section."
3. Employee complaint to Bureau: Any employee on the project paid less than the applicable Prevailing Wage file a written complaint with the Bureau and, at the employee's written request, the Director may take an assignment of a claim in trust for the assigning employee and bring any legal action necessary to collect the claim. The employer is to pay the cost and reasonable attorney's fees allowed by the Court if found in violation of Section 4115.03 to 4115.16. See section 4115.10(B).
4. Bureau Suit for Recovery: If upon investigation, the Director determines that a violation has occurred, and no employee files a lawsuit or requests the Director to take an assignment of his wage claim within sixty days, the

Director **must** bring legal action to collect **twice** the amount owed to employees. See section 4115.10(c).

5. **Bureau Investigation**: The Director of the Bureau of Employment Services, either upon motion or within five days of the filing of a complaint by an employee under Section 4115.10 or by an interested party under 4115.16 must investigate any alleged violation of Sections 4115.03 to 4115.16. The investigation, powers, duties, hearings, and results of convictions are set forth in sections 4115.131 and 4115.132, O.R.C. For further action on complaints of violations and action by the Bureau, see section 4115.16. See sections 4115.13, 4115.131, 4115.132, 4115.14, and 4115.16.
6. **Penalties**: Section 4115.99 provides that whoever violates Division (c) of Section 4115.071 (Reports to Wage Coordinator, payroll certification), 4115.10 (Failure to pay requisite wage level), and 4115.11 (method of payment – cash) is guilty of a misdemeanor of the second degree for the first offense; and for each subsequent offense, guilty of a misdemeanor of the first degree. For penalty for misdemeanors, see section 2929.21.
7. **List of Convicted Contractors and Subcontractors**: The Bureau is to file with the Ohio Secretary of State a list of contractors and subcontractors who it finds have been prosecuted and convicted for violations of Sections 4115.03 to 4115.16 and each such contractor or subcontractor will be prohibited (a) from contracting directly or indirectly with any public authority for the construction of a public improvement, or (b) from performing any work on a public improvement as a contractor or subcontractor for a period of two years from the date of conviction. In addition, no public authority is to award a contract to any such contractor or subcontractor during the time its name appears on such list. See section 4115.133.

E. **General**

The Bureau is empowered to make reasonable regulations for contractors and subcontractors to facilitate the administration of the applicable Chapter 4115, O.R.C. requirements. See section 4115.12.

It is recommended that when contacting the Bureau for the Determination and requesting the identity or designation of a Wage Coordinator, also request a copy of any regulations that may have been adopted pursuant to Section 4115.12.

Section 4115.05 provides, in part: "Where contracts are not awarded or construction undertaken within ninety days from the date of the establishment of the prevailing wages, there shall be a redetermination of the prevailing rate of wages before the contract is awarded." The expiration date of this wage schedule is listed above for your convenience only. This wage determination is not intended as a blanket determination to be used for all projects during this period without prior approval of this Department.

Section 4115.04, Ohio Revised Code provides, in part: "Such schedule of wages shall be attached to and made a part of the specifications for the work, and shall be printed on the bidding blanks where the work is done by contract..."

The contract between the letting authority and the successful bidder shall contain a statement requiring that mechanics and laborers be paid a prevailing rate of wage as required in Section 4115.06, Ohio Revised Code.

The contractor or subcontractor is required to file with the contracting public authority upon completion of the project and prior to final payment therefore an affidavit stating that he has fully complied with Chapter 4115 of the Ohio Revised Code.

The wage rates contained in this schedule are the "Prevailing Wages" as defined by Section 4115.03, Ohio Revised Code (the basic hourly rates plus certain fringe benefits). These rates and fringes shall be a minimum to be paid under a contract regulated by Chapter 4115 of the Ohio Revised Code by contractors and subcontractors. The prevailing wage rates contained in this schedule include the effective dates and wage rates currently on file. In cases where future effective dates are not included in this schedule, modifications to the wage schedule will be furnished to the Prevailing Wage Coordinator appointed by the public authority as soon as prevailing wage rates increases are received by this office.

"There shall be posted in a prominent and accessible place on the site of work a legible statement of the Schedule of Wage Rates specified in the contract to the various classifications of laborers, workmen, and mechanics employed, said statement to remain posted during the life of such contract." Section 4115.07, Ohio Revised Code.

Apprentices will be permitted to work only under a bona fide apprenticeship program if such program exists and if such program is registered with the Ohio Apprenticeship Council.

Section 4115.071 provides that no later than ten days before the first payment of wages is due to any employee of any contractor or subcontractor working on a contract regulated by Chapter 4115, Ohio Revised Code, the contracting public authority shall appoint one of his own employees to act as the prevailing wage coordinator for said contract. The duties of the prevailing wage coordinator are outlined in Section 4115.071 of the Ohio Revised Code.

Section 4115.05 provides for an escalator in the prevailing wage rate. Each time a new rate is established, that rate is required to be paid on all ongoing public improvement projects.

A further requirement of Section 4115.05 of the Ohio Revised Code is: "On the occasion of the first pay date under a contract, the contractor shall furnish each employee not covered by a collective bargaining agreement or understanding between employers and bona fide organizations of Labor with individual written notification of the job classification to which the employee is assigned, the prevailing wage determined to be applicable to that classification, separated into the hourly rate of pay and the fringe payments, and the identity of the prevailing wage Coordinator appointed by the public authority. The contractor or subcontractor shall furnish the same notification to each affected employee every time the job classification of the employee is changed."

Work performed in connection with the installation of modular furniture may be subject to prevailing wage.

The next number, 0010 in the example, is an internal number used in producing the wage determination. 08/29/2014 indicates the survey completion date for the classifications and rates under that identifier.

A UAVG rate will be updated once a year, usually in January of each year, to reflect a weighted average of the current negotiated/CBA rate of the union locals from which the rate is based.

CTL appreciates the opportunity to provide our materials testing and inspection services to the Lorain County Crisis Receiving Center project. Per your request, the following letter details our scope of services, as well as provides a cost estimate to complete the necessary testing and inspections for the project.

PROJECT LOCATION AND DESCRIPTION

The project consists of the construction of a new Crisis Receiving Center for Lorain, OH. The building will be a multi-story, 29,784 square foot building which will be supported by concrete spread footings and steel framing. This construction will include earthwork and fill placement, reinforcing concrete foundations, structural steel framing and roofing, concrete slabs on grade and metal decks, and parking lot/roadway pavement. Site and building utilities, fire prevention systems, and building envelope systems will also be included in the construction.

As part of our estimate, we are also including the surface repairs of the existing Nord Center Parking Lot, which is adjacent to the Crisis Receiving Center project.

A. Scope of Services

Based on our conversations, statement of special inspections, and our experience on similar projects, we anticipate that our services will include the following inspection, testing and special inspection services:

1. Determination of suitability of materials for use as engineered fills, backfill and sub-base.
2. Inspection and testing of soil compaction operations during placement of fills and backfills.
3. Inspection of foundation bearing soils to confirm proper bearing strength and soil types & conditions.
4. Inspection of reinforcing steel and mesh size and arrangement.
5. Inspection, sampling and testing of cast-in-place concrete.
6. Inspection and testing of post installed concrete anchors.
7. Inspection and testing of structural steel connections.

8. Inspection and testing of asphalt and concrete pavement, walks and exterior slabs.
9. Inspection of fireproofing and fire-stopping materials.
10. Inspection of roof framing and building enclosures, including vapor barrier and spray applied insulation observation and testing.

As part of Alternate C (Nord Center resurfacing), we also expect to provide core sampling of the parking lot to verify the depth of pavement and aggregate base. We will also patch these core locations.

Cost of Services Estimate

CTL has attached to this letter our unit fee schedule, which we will use for the duration of the project. The costs of special inspections and testing can vary based on weather conditions, project scheduling, and contractor sequencing. As of the development of this cost estimate, no project schedule is available to review. The following cost estimate is based on our experience with similar sized projects. Once the contractor has provided a detailed and sequenced project schedule, we can refine this estimate.

CTL makes the follow assumptions for the project:

1. For budgeting purposes, we expect to utilize an Engineering Technician for earthwork testing, reinforcing and concrete inspections, and other pavement or site work testing. We expect these visits to last 8 hours, portal to portal, each day.
2. For each day CTL is onsite, we will utilize ½ hour of Project Management time for technician coordination, report review, and report distribution. We also expect to provide approximately 4 hours of PM time to review contractor/supplier QC plans and mix designs for the project.
3. During the earthwork and site work phases of the project, our technician will utilize a nuclear density gauge for verifying in place compaction and moisture content of soils, aggregates, and asphalt pavement. For the life of the project, we expect to obtain two (2) soil samples, and one (1) aggregate sample for standard proctor and gradation testing.
4. For each day of asphalt pavement, we anticipate collecting one (1) bulk sample of asphalt for extraction and gradation testing. Although we can provide core sampling services, we will not obtain cores for density verification; the only coring will be for the Nord Center parking lot for thickness verification.
5. For concrete placements, CTL will cast at least one set of five (5) cylinders every 150 cubic yards, with at least one set being made each concrete placement. For slab on grade or slab on deck placements, we estimate that 3 sets of cylinders will be made, while we expect to make one set for wall or foundation placements.
6. For slab on grade placements, CTL will attempt to have the same technician perform both the concrete testing and floor flatness testing. However, for budgeting purposes, we have included a four visit for each floor slab for flatness and levelness testing. An Allen Face D-Meter will be used to perform flatness testing.
7. For structural steel framing, we estimate that a Structural Steel inspector will be utilized for 6 hours, portal to portal, for inspections. As the project is expected to include moment connections and full penetrating welds, we estimate that (2) of these visits will utilize

Ultrasonic Testing (UT) equipment.

8. For firestopping and fireproofing visits, we will utilize a Senior Engineering Technician. We expect these visits will last 6 hours, portal to portal. If intumescent fireproofing is chosen for the project, there will only be the technician's time for each day, as well as a charge for a thickness gauge.
9. For spray applied or cementitious fireproofing, CTL will perform in place bond testing as well as lab density testing of samples. Based on the square footage of the project, we expect to perform 24 bond tests and 24 density tests for fireproofing.
10. For Roofing Inspections, we will utilize a team of two (2) certified roof observers, who will be dispatched from our Columbus office. We anticipate two visits for roofing inspection, which will last 8 hours, portal to portal.

Sample retrieval and delivery will be billed at the unit rates listed. Minimum show-up charges will not apply.

CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT

THIS CONSULTING SERVICES AGREEMENT (“Agreement”), is made this ____ day of _____, 2023 between the Mental Health, Addiction, and Recovery Services Board of Lorain County (“MHARS Board”) and CTL Engineering, Inc. (“Consultant”).

RECITALS:

1. The MHARS Board and the Consultant mutually desire to contract with each other for the Consultant to provide services associated with the MHARS Board crisis receiving center construction (“Project”).
2. The Consultant is uniquely qualified, experienced, and willing to perform said work on the terms and conditions set forth herein.

NOW THEREFORE, for and in consideration of the mutual promises, covenants and agreements hereinafter set forth, the parties to this Agreement, with intent to be legally bound, agree as follows:

ARTICLE 1: SCOPE AND PERFORMANCE OF WORK

The Consultant agrees to provide assessment services for the MHARS Board for the intended development of the Project, such services being described in Exhibit A attached hereto and incorporated herein (collectively, “Services”). The Consultant shall promptly commence performance of the Services after written or verbal authorization by the MHARS Board’s authorized representative.

The Consultant shall perform the Services consistent with the degree of care and skill exercised by prudent and experienced consultants and firms that perform building assessment and project feasibility services in the State of Ohio (“Standard of Care”). The Consultant shall, at all times, perform the Services in a professional manner and in accordance with all applicable laws, rules, orders, decrees, ordinances and statutes, and otherwise in accordance with the Standard of Care.

The Consultant covenants that in performing the services, it shall use or employ only qualified personnel. The Consultant represents and warrants that it has personnel experienced in providing services for projects similar in scope and complexity to the Services to be provided hereunder, and that the Consultant shall use such personnel so as to provide the Services in accordance with the Standard of Care. The MHARS Board may require the Consultant to remove any person providing Services for the Project that the MHARS Board reasonably deems unfit for his or her duties.

ARTICLE 2: SCHEDULE OF PAYMENTS

To compensate the Consultant for services rendered, the MHARS Board agrees to pay the Consultant an amount not to exceed Seventy-Six Thousand One Hundred Seventy-Five Dollars (\$76,175.00) (the “Consulting Fee”).

The Consultant shall submit, in a format acceptable to the MHARS Board, monthly invoices for services performed in a previous calendar month. Each project and each task within a project shall be the subject of a separate invoice. The Consultant shall maintain time and expense records and provide them to the MHARS Board upon request.

The MHARS Board shall pay all invoices within thirty (30) days of receipt of a proper invoice from the Consultant. If the services rendered do not meet the requirements of this Agreement, the Consultant shall correct or modify the work to comply with this Agreement. The MHARS Board may withhold payment for such work until it meets the requirements of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 3: TERM

The term of this Agreement shall commence upon the full execution hereof by the MHARS Board and the Consultant, and shall remain in full force and effect until the full completion of the Services, as confirmed by the MHARS Board in writing, or the earlier termination of this Agreement as hereinafter provided.

ARTICLE 4: TERMINATION

This Agreement may be terminated by the MHARS Board upon ten (10) business days' prior written notice to the Consultant in the event of a breach hereof by the Consultant, provided that the Consultant does not cure such breach within the ten (10) day period after it receives written notice of the same, except that there shall be no cure period in the event of the Consultant's failure to maintain insurance as required herein. This Agreement may be terminated at any time by the MHARS Board for its convenience upon fourteen (14) days' prior written notice. In the event of termination for convenience, the MHARS Board shall pay the Consultant for the Services actually provided (but not in excess of the Consulting Fee), but not for lost profit and overhead.

ARTICLE 5: INSPECTION AND AUDIT

The Consultant shall maintain all books, records, documents, and other evidence pertaining to the costs and expenses allowable under this Agreement in accordance with generally accepted accounting practices. All such books and records required to be maintained by this Agreement shall be subject to inspection and audit by representatives of the MHARS Board and/or the Ohio State Auditor at all reasonable times, and the Consultant shall afford the proper facilities for such inspection and audit. Representatives of the MHARS Board and/or the Ohio State Auditor may copy such books, accounts, and records if necessary to conduct or document an audit. The Consultant shall preserve and make available all such books of account and records for a period of three (3) years after final payment under this Agreement. In the event that any audit or inspection identifies any discrepancy in such financial records, the Consultant shall provide the MHARS Board with appropriate clarification and/or financial adjustments within thirty (30) calendar days of notification of the discrepancy.

ARTICLE 6: INDEPENDENT CONTRACTOR

The Consultant and the MHARS Board understand and expressly agree that the Consultant is an independent contractor in the performance of each and every part of this Agreement. The Consultant expressly represents, warrants, and agrees that the Consultant's status as an independent contractor in the performance of the work and services required under this Agreement. The Consultant, as an independent contractor, assumes the entire responsibility for carrying out and accomplishing the services required under this Agreement. The Consultant shall make no claim of MHARS Board employment nor shall the Consultant claim any related employment benefits, social security, retirement benefits, or any other pertinent government employment benefits.

ARTICLE 7: OWNERSHIP OF DOCUMENTS AND REPORTS

The Consultant agrees that all field data, analytical results, studies, drawings, maps, computations, plans, specifications, estimates and other documented evidence of the work prepared by or for Consultant under the provisions of this Agreement, shall become and remain the property of the MHARS Board upon termination or completion of the Services. If applicable, the MHARS Board requires all drawings to be submitted in AutoCAD release 14 or later, with MHARS Board supplied floor plans (where available) to be used as base plans. AIA layering standards will apply. If applicable, Consultant shall provide the MHARS Board with both a hard copy and an electronic copy of all plans, including, without limitation, as-built drawings to be given to the MHARS Board upon termination or completion of the Services.

ARTICLE 8: CONFIDENTIALITY

The Consultant shall treat as confidential and not disclose to third parties, or use for its own benefit, any of the MHARS Board's confidential or proprietary information except to the extent such disclosure may be required by applicable laws, rules or regulations, provided, however, that the Consultant shall use its best efforts to notify the MHARS Board prior to making any such disclosure.

ARTICLE 9: INDEMNIFICATION

To the fullest extent permitted by law, the Consultant shall indemnify and hold harmless, the MHARS Board, Lorain County, and their respective representatives, departments, agents, consultants, employees and contractors, from and against claims, damages, losses and expenses, including, but not limited to, reasonable attorneys' fees arising out of or in connection with any negligent acts, errors or omissions, of the Consultant and/or its employees, officers, agents, representatives, contractors, consultants or subconsultants (including, without limitation, the Authorized Subconsultants). The Consultant agrees to pay all damages, costs and expenses of the MHARS Board in defending any action arising out of the aforementioned acts or omissions.

ARTICLE 10: INSURANCE

The Consultant shall maintain professional liability insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per claim and \$1,000,000 in the aggregate, and commercial general insurance in the amount of \$1,000,000 per occurrence and \$1,000,000 in the aggregate. The Consultant shall name the MHARS Board as an additional insured on the commercial general certificate of insurance for the duration of this Agreement and shall maintain such insurance for a period of one year after the termination of this Agreement.

ARTICLE 11: DEFAULT

Notwithstanding anything to the contrary contained in this Agreement, if 1) the Consultant shall be adjudicated bankrupt or becomes insolvent; 2) a receiver, trustee, administrator, custodian or other person or entity acting pursuant to any agreement, law, resolution, rule, order or license or any governmental body, agency or department shall take possession or control of all or a substantial portion of the Consultant's assets or affairs; 3) the Consultant shall give notice of, petition for, enter into or make an assignment for the benefit of creditors or shall file or have filed against it a petition, pleading or any other like document of bankruptcy or insolvency or for reorganization or a petition, pleading or other like document demanding or requesting the appointment of a trustee, receiver, administrator, custodian or other person or entity to act for or on behalf of the Consultant or its creditors; or 4) any writ, execution, attachment or other warrant or authority, however denominated, shall be issued against the Consultant or any of the Consultant's property, and such adjudication, appointment, assignment, petition, writ, execution, attachment or other warrant or authority shall not be set aside, vacated, discharged or bonded within sixty (60) days after the issuance of the same, then the Consultant shall be deemed in default under

this Agreement and the MHARS Board may terminate this Agreement without the requirement of giving the Consultant notice of such default.

ARTICLE 12: COMPLIANCE; NON-DISCRIMINATION

The Consultant agrees to comply with all applicable federal, state and local laws in the performances of the Services. The Consultant accepts full responsibility for payment of all unemployment compensation insurance premiums, worker's compensation premiums, all income tax deductions, pension deductions and any and all other taxes or payroll deductions required for the Consultant and all employees engaged by the Consultant for the performance of the Services by this Agreement, and shall defend, indemnify and hold the MHARS Board harmless from and against any and all claims, demands and suits arising from its failure to pay such taxes. The Consultant represents and warrants that it meets, and will continue to meet, any and all licensing requirements of the State of Ohio. During the performance of this Agreement, the Consultant will not discriminate against any employee or applicant for employment because of race, color, religion, sex, national origin, ancestry, handicap, age, political belief or place of birth.

ARTICLE 13: ASSIGNMENTS

The parties expressly agree that this Agreement shall not be assigned by the Consultant without the prior written approval of the MHARS Board.

ARTICLE 14: NOTICES

Program Design & Project Description

1. Describe the proposed project/program and facility.

Lorain County Crisis Receiving Center (CRC). The first-floor emergency operations will serve approximately 8,970 annually. The second floor of the center will provide detox services to an anticipated 1,000 clients annually. The building will have a total of 29,070 square feet, outdoor area reserved for program participants. Sally port connected to the building with ample parking spaces for program participants and staff. The proposed building is a modern style architect creating a warm and welcoming environment as an alternative to the emergency room.

2. What are the services to be provided as part of the project (e.g., services, ratios, and hours of operation)?

24/7 behavioral health and substance use disorder emergency care
24/7 American Society of Addiction Medicine Level 3.1, 3.2 WM, 3.5 and 3.7 detoxification

The behavioral health and substance use disorder emergency access and treatment will support a length of stay not to exceed 23 hours. No wrong door approach. Police, fire, and EMS drop off. Diversion from jail.

By providing an alternative care model, people experiencing these types of crises no longer have to wait hours, sometimes days, in an emergency department nor be incarcerated. They can receive rapid counseling, medication stabilization and assessment with disposition to an appropriate level of care. All of this being provided in a setting that is warm, inviting and therapeutic to both the clients and their friends/family. Furthermore, the crisis receiving center expands the county's capacity to provide inpatient detoxification services.

5. How will consumers gain access to the project/program?

- 24/7 emergency/crisis hotline
- Mobile crisis teams dispatched 24/7
- Integrated peer support
- "No wrong door" approach

6. Describe the project/program relationship to the behavioral health system and community?

The Nord Center is part of a community-wide initiative to revolutionize the crisis care for behavioral health and substance use disorder in our county. Partners include The LCADA Way and the Mental Health, Addiction and Recovery Resources Board of Lorain County, among others. Currently, residents of Lorain County, experiencing a behavioral health crisis or substance use disorder emergency, primarily have two options:

- Go to an emergency room at a great expense to the patient and to the community;
- Go to jail, which overburdens our local law-enforcement agencies

By providing an alternative care model, people experiencing this type of crisis no longer have to wait hours, sometimes days, in an emergency department nor be incarcerated. They can receive rapid counseling, medication stabilization and assessment with disposition to an appropriate level of care. All of this being provided in the setting that is warm, inviting and therapeutic to both clients and their friends/family. Furthermore, the crisis receiving center expands the county's capacity to provide inpatient detoxification services. Over 700 individuals are sent out of the county each year for the services.

In addition to offering an effective and therapeutic alternative to the patients and their families, there are many benefits to the community. Some of those include:

- Decompression of local emergency rooms
- Decrease utilization of law-enforcement services due to the rapid warm handoff to crisis receiving center personnel

The benefits of this care delivery model also extend to the payers. By providing access to emergency counseling, medication stabilization and quality assessment and disposition, there is a level of care coordination that results and decrease cost per patient as a result of using services that are less expensive and less resource intensive.

Several sites were given consideration for the project. Each site was evaluated with the primary goal being ease of access. 6130 S. Broadway serves as the optimal site for this project as it is right off a major interchange. It is virtually equidistant from both municipality city halls in which the crisis system sees most of its volume

10. Describe how the project/program environment and service(s) will appeal to persons of diverse backgrounds and cultures? Explain how you will accommodate individuals who do not wish to participate in twelve-step or other faith-based treatment or supports.

Nord will seek to employ team members of diverse backgrounds in an effort to give consumers healthcare personnel that look like them. Furthermore, the 24/7 access capitalizes on the courage that this population, especially people of color, must overcome in order to comfortably seek behavioral health and substance use disorder services. The National CLAS Standards describe a framework to deliver services that are culturally and linguistically appropriate and respectful, and that respond to patients' cultural health beliefs, preferences and communication needs. The Nord Center employs a full-time director of diversity, equity and inclusion (DEI), and collaborates with MHASRS Board and The LCADA Way to support DEI training. Also, clients of the program shall not be required to participate in a faith-based program and/or service. The Nord Center is not a faith-based organization

11. How will this project/program enhance other available services in the community and mental health & addiction system?

In 2017, the Lorain County Suicide Prevention Coalition engaged RI International Consulting to assess the county's current crisis response systems and readiness to adopt a Crisis Now model. RI International is a leader in the use of crisis system best practices from across the country. Local law enforcement, hospitals, non-profits, local foundations, the Mental Health, Addiction and Recovery Services Board of Lorain County, along with The Nord Center were engaged in the process. The resulting Crisis System Optimization report indicated a growing need for crisis services throughout the county.

Currently, The Nord Center's Emergency Stabilization Services include a National Suicide Prevention Lifeline Crisis Center, Mobile Crisis Teams, and a Crisis Respite Center. The Lifeline Crisis Call Center is staffed 24/7, 365 days a year, with highly trained staff that screen callers and identify needs and next steps. The Crisis Call Center currently fields more than 18,000 calls a year.

The Nord Center's Mobile Crisis Teams are dispatched in the community to provide in-person mental health screenings to individuals assessed as having a high level of risk.

Mobile teams are currently being dispatched on average of eight times per day in response to Lifeline Crisis Call Center calls and other community needs.

The Nord Center provides a resource for individuals in the community to voluntarily seek help, hospitals to refer patients for step-down treatment following hospitalization, and emergency room and police departments to refer individuals requiring care. While the Crisis Respite Center offers a temporary residential stay for low acuity patients, diversifying local treatment options is critical for building a continuum of care.

The Crisis System Optimization report identified a local gap in resources that offer an immediate response for helping individuals avoid a mental health crisis. The proposed project includes establishing a mental health and substance use disorder urgent/emergent care to support individuals in maintaining stability, offering walk-in access to services such as medication evaluation, psychiatric assessment, and referrals to community treatment resources. The goal of the mental health urgent/emergent care is to help individuals avoid a crisis that may lead to involuntary hospitalization, emergency room visits, and incarceration.

Additionally, local hospitals and police departments reported insufficient support to immediately divert individuals from emergency rooms, bookings and jails into proper treatment. In response, MHARS Board, The Nord Center and The LCADA Way, along with other community partners are developing a Crisis Receiving Center. The Crisis Receiving Center will provide a safe and secure setting with temporary 23-hour care for individuals experiencing a crisis. The short-term treatment center will be immediately accessible for hospitals and local police to efficiently transfer care of individuals for assessment and stabilization with the goal of safely returning individuals home or to appropriate treatment facilities.

ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION

AND BY-LAWS

INFORMATION REQUIRED IN ARTICLES OF INCORPORATION AND BY-LAWS FOR PRIVATE, NOT FOR
PROFIT CORPORATIONS

All not-for-profit corporations applying for State community construction assistance funds from the Department directly, or in conjunction with a limited partnership or limited liability corporation shall be subject to the following requirements regarding corporate purposes, the board of trustees, members and employees of the corporation.

- (A) The Articles of Incorporation have the following provisions in addition to those otherwise required by law:

A specific statement of purpose that the corporation will provide a mental health and/or an addiction service that will serve a public purpose.

A provision that upon dissolution of the corporation the Department or its successor shall be a party to any judicial proceeding or other dissolution proceeding or agreement and that the Department or its successor may be distribute under such order or agreement to the extent of its participation and the extent provided by law or participation agreement which originally set forth disbursal of funds to the corporation.

- (B) The Constitution or By-Laws have the following provisions in addition to those otherwise required by law:

A description of the methods for selection, appointment, or election to the Board, and the methods of selection, appointment, or election of officers.

A provision limiting the term of office of trustee and officers, and prohibiting an employee or officer of the corporation from being a trustee.

A provision stating that the board of trustees shall include representative of the community to be served.

A provision that no person related by consanguinity or marriage shall constitute a majority of the board of trustees.

A provision to require the abstention of trustee in a vote on a matter directly affecting persons employed or to be employed by the corporation and related to the trustee by consanguinity or marriage.

A provision, where applicable, which will place the corporation in a tax-exempt status pursuant to Federal Internal Revenue statues and regulations (Section 501 or the Internal Revenue Code, as amended).

A non-discrimination provision stating that service will neither be rendered nor denied on the basis of race, color, religion, national origin, disability, sexual orientation, military status, or unless programmatically justifiable, gender.
